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# Where were you in 1988?



The year was 1988. You could fill up your gas tank for 91 cents a gallon, and see *Rain Man* for \$3.50 at the theater. *Wonder Years* was the big new hit on television, and the B-2 bomber prototype was revealed in Palmdale. And, if you were one of 41,000 people living in Apple Valley, you may have voted on November 7 for the Town's incorporation. On that date, nearly 84% of the voters said "yes" to local control, improved roads, increased police services and "A Better Way of Life"! Twenty-five years later, public safety and infrastructure remain the top two priorities in the Vision 2020 strategic plan.

The results were certified and the Town officially incorporated on November 28. Spearheaded by a group called AVID (Apple Valley Incorporation Drive), the process began in 1985 under the guidance of Dick Pearson, who would go on to be elected to the first Town Council. Also elected from a field of 30 candidates were Nick DePrisco, Heidi Larkin, Carl Coleman and Jack Collingsworth.

#### Where are the apples?!

Each fall we field calls from folks looking to visit apple orchards. We have to direct them to Oak Glen or Julian now, but once upon a time there were apples! Accounts vary as to whether the area was named for the apple orchards that flourished along the Mojave River through the 1920s or, more likely, from a shortened version of the Appleton Land Company, an area developer in the early 1900s.



# **Busy intersection gets a makeover**

With daily traffic counts nearing 45,000, the intersection of Kasota Road and Highway 18 received a much needed upgrade in recent weeks.

"This is one of the busiest intersections on Highway 18, second only behind Apple Valley Road," explained Brad Miller, town engineer.

Funded by Measure I, the half-cent transportation sales tax in San Bernardino County, the project widened the road and allowed for a dedicated left turn lane in each direction on Kasota. Pedestrian crossings were brought into compliance with ADA requirements at the same time. Caltrans and the Town of Apple Valley cooperated on the efforts.

The intersection is home to St Joseph Health, St. Mary Medical Center, with the entrance to the main parking lot and emergency room just to the north. The dedicated left turn lanes have noticeably improved the flow of traffic, and even resulted in calls and emails of appreciation to Town offices.

In conjunction with the intersection improvements, a sidewalk and bus shelter were added on South Outer Highway 18, just east of Kasota. This is an important stop in the Town's public transit schedule, serving the many medical offices and businesses nearby.  $\bullet$

# The ABC's of Water Safety

Warmer weather means more time in and around the water. Startling statistics show that drowning is the nation's number one killer of children under the age of 5 and it's the second leading cause of death for ages 1 to 14. By following the safety precautions below year-round, you can help to prevent your family from becoming a statistic.



#### A: Adult Supervision

- NEVER leave a child alone by or in the water, even for a second.
- Assign an adult to maintain eye-to-eye supervision of children around the pool, especially at parties.
- Floaties or other inflatable flotation devices should NEVER be substituted for adult supervision.
- Know your location address and phone number in the event 9-1-1 is called.

#### **B:** Barriers

- Have a self closing/latching isolation fence that separates your pool from any other area.
- Keep all doors and windows leading to the pool area locked or alarmed.
- Move objects away from pool fences so a child cannot climb up to unlatch or climb over the fence.

# **Aerification to improve greens**

Sometimes things have to get worse before they get better. The semiannual aerification of the golf course can fall into that category. The greens may look a little rough and not roll too well, but when we aerify the greens, we are doing so many beneficial things that the disturbance to the surface of the green is worth it.

Aerification is when holes are punched into the greens and backfilled with sand. Aerifying helps promote root depth of the turf; it allows for better water percolation provides a higher rate of oxygen exchange from the air to the root zone; and aides in relieving soil compaction.

Aerification is usually performed twice a year, once in the spring and once in the later summer or early fall, to keep the greens at their best.

# Recycled water project to beautify and irrigate Golf Course



Brewster Park will soon be home to a recycled water plant that will irrigate the Town's parks, schools and golf course.

The Apple Valley Golf Course will soon host two new ponds and a meandering stream, designed to accommodate a recycled water project, beautifying the course and providing the town with a valuable new resource.

The Victor Valley Wastewater Reclamation Authority has been working to build a recycled water plant for two decades, and it is finally nearing construction. The facility will produce recycled water that can be used to irrigate parks, schools and the town's golf course.

The recycled water facility will be built at Brewster Park, and will store treated water that isn't used during winter months in specially built water features at the Apple Valley Golf Course.

"We were thrilled when we discovered a way to benefit both

the town and our agency, as well as contribute to the golf course," said Logan Olds, Victor Valley Wastewater Reclamation Authority's general manager.

The brainchild of Olds, the project will benefit the Town through the beautification and irrigation of the public course as well as VWWRA, which is required to have percolation ponds as part if it's recycled water facility.

There is already infrastructure in place that will transport the water from the park to the golf course. The Town also expects to use the water to irrigate several parks at considerable savings. The project could break ground as early as this fall.  $\bullet$ 





### Pet Pantry aims to reduce surrendered animals

While the shelter has sponsored food giveaways in the past, the Pet




Pantry is designed to be a sustainable program through the efforts of Kayla Engeron, a student in the "Me & My Shadow" mentoring program, a corps of shelter volunteers between the ages of 10 and 17. Kayla, a seventh grade Girl Scout Cadette, took on the endeavor to achieve her Silver Award, the highest award a Girl Scout of her age can earn.

"People who can't afford to feed their pets turn them into the shelter or just let them go in the street," explained Kayla. "By offering food to these families, I hope they can keep their pets at home, so we have less abandoned animals in Apple Valley."

Apple Valley Animal Services (AVAS) has helped 26 families so far. Applications for assistance are available from the shelter. Families who don't need assistance, but would like to contribute can drop off dog and cat food, treats, and pet toys that will be shared with needy families, helping to keep animals out of the shelter and in a loving home.
