Apple Valley Police Department names new Captain

Change is nothing new in the Sheriff's Department. Officers, sergeants and other staff transfer in and out frequently; but this March will mark a changing of the guard when Lieutenant Lana Tomlin is promoted to Captain following the retirement of Captain Bart Belknap, a seasoned veteran who has served with the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department for nearly three decades.

"I've had 16 different assignments in 28 years and I've been in Apple Valley for 4 and a half years," said Captain Belknap. "I couldn't have written a better script for my career to end here in Apple Valley because this is my hometown."

Among his many assignments were patrol in Hesperia, Victorville and Apple Valley; patrol sergeant, narcotics detective, management of Sheriff's Communications, Technical Services, Records, Internal Affairs, Central Detention Center and the Coroner's Office.

"After 28 years I still enjoy coming to work because of the people here," Capt. Belknap explained. "We make an incredibly difficult job fun. There is a lot of laughing that goes into our work."

Likewise, Lt. Tomlin has served in a variety of departments from Administration to Narcotics and from Custody to S.W.A.T. However, she said that being stationed in Apple Valley is the best kept secret in the department.

"This is a great assignment. We get great support from the community and great support from the Town," she said. "I love that we get to interact with the community in a positive way at the special events and activities that the Town provides for its residents, such as the summer concert series or the Freedom Festival."

Lt. Tomlin is approaching 22 years in law enforcement.

Despite his job satisfaction, Capt. Belknap said he is looking forward to his retirement. He and his wife Gerda, who retired from Alaska Federal Credit Union this year, have purchased land in Idaho and are making plans for a permanent move there.

Captain Belknap's departure isn't the only change taking place in the Sheriff's Department. Administrative Sergeant Shawn Henry has replaced Sgt. Marie Spain, who returned to patrol. Patrol Sergeant Rod McDonald transferred into the department to replace Sgt. Randy Gwaltney, who passed away from cancer in January; and Sgt. Troy Cook has been reassigned from Patrol to manage the Gang team.

A major earthquake is one of the greatest natural disaster threats to the residents of the High Desert. One way to be prepared is to join your local Community Emergency Response Team (C.E.R.T.), a nationwide program designed to teach residents how to take care of their families, friends and neighbors during a disaster.

Apple Valley residents are encouraged to sign up for the next C.E.R.T. training that will take place over three sessions, March 3, 17 and 31.

Following a major disaster, emergency resources will be quickly depleted. C.E.R.T.

graduates know how to take care of themselves and their loved ones. They can then extend



that knowledge into their neighborhoods and the community. C.E.R.T. members learn about disaster preparedness, how to make emergency kits for the home and the car, basic first aid, light search and rescue, fire suppression, terrorism awareness, and disaster psychology. In addition, there are further training opportunities for assisting in sheltering operations, sandbagging, special needs, and fire hose training. There are approximately 170 C.E.R.T. members in Apple Valley. It won't be long before you are trading your sweater for swim apparel. Get a jump on the summer by joining in on some of the Town's aquatic programs.

Swim season kicks off Saturday, May 19 at the Parks and Recreation Swim Fair. Registration for this summer's swim lessons will be open for Apple Valley residents from 7:30 to 10 a.m. Non-residents can register beginning at 10 a.m., or whenever the Apple Valley line is empty.

Swim lesson schedule will be available May 1. Enroll carefully as there are no refunds, transfers or credits. Proof of Apple Valley residency with a photo identification and utility bill is required. Only a parent or legal guardian can register children for classes. The line will form between Town Hall and the Police Department next to the white gazebo. Registration transactions will take place inside the Council Chambers.

The Aquatic Center features a junior Olympic-sized pool with crystal clear water that is heated to a comfortable temperature for year-round use. Swim and Save

Purchase an Aquatic Quick Card and save on fees for Public Swim and Lap Swim sessions. The initial cost for the card is \$2 and can be loaded for multiple, money-saving sessions. Public Swim Passes begin at \$10 for 5 sessions, but purchase a 30-session pass for \$46, and save \$14. Lap Swim Passes start at \$15 for 5 sessions, but offer a \$21 savings with the purchase of a \$69, 30-session pass. Lifeguard Training

The American Red Cross will offer lifeguard training at the Aquatic Center in March and April for ages 15 and older. The comprehensive course includes instruction on first aid, automated external defibrillator and CPR. Class size is limited so register early. Down Payment Assistance available for first time homebuyers

Stop paying rent! Apple Valley can help low, moderate and middle income homebuyers purchase their first home. The recent changes in redevelopment in California have not impacted this program, and funds are available now. The CalHome program is funded through the Housing and Emergency Shelter Trust Fund Act of 2006 to reduce the blight of vacant homes and expand the supply of affordable housing. Town assistance is provided to low-income homebuyers as a 0% interest loan, deferred for a maximum of 30 years.

The Neighborhood Stabilization Program Down Payment Assistance Program helps families buy foreclosed or abandoned homes within eligible Town areas.



Town assistance is provided to low, moderate or middle income homebuyers as a 0% interest loan, deferred for a maximum of 45 years. Funding is provided through the Housing and Economic Recovery Act of 2008.

There are no monthly payments made on the deferred loans. Interested buyers should contact a Town-approved participating lender to be pre-qualified for a conventional fixed-rate first mortgage. The lender will calculate the level of assistance to be provided by the Town before buyers meet with their realtor to select a home within an allowable price range in an eligible area.

Puppies on the mend after holiday abandonment and disease

No one wants to be abandoned, cold and hungry, let alone a few days before Christmas, but that is exactly what happened to seven shepherd mix puppies on December 18. Piled in a box with a dirty blanket, nine puppies were abandoned in the parking lot of the municipal animal shelter where an Animal Services staff member found them.

"These puppies fought an up-hill battle from day one," said Animal Services Manager Gina Schwin-Whiteside. "They started showing signs of Parvo while they were in quarantine."

After treatment, all but two of the puppies pulled through the Parvo, but were then set back with an upper respiratory infection.

"People should be aware that stray animals can be contagious without showing signs of illness," said Schwin-Whiteside. "Bringing a stray into your home is a thoughtful gesture, but keep them isolated from any pets in your home."

Fortunately, these puppies have a happy ending. All of them were rescued and placed with foster families by the Westside German Shepherd Rescue in Orange County.



Etiquette in golf By Rik Laubenstein, AVGC Golf Pro

One of the best things the great game of golf teaches its players is etiquette. Below is a list of common opportunities for etiquette in the game of golf. Follow these recommendations, and you will be sought after as a golf partner.

- 1. Sand traps: When your golf ball lands in a bunker, rake the bunker when you're done so the players behind you will not have to hit out of a foot print.
- 2. Fairway divots: Attached to each golf cart here at AVGC are two bottles of sand. After you hit your shot and make a divot in the fairway, use the sand to fill in the hole. This is will make the ground level again and the turf will take less time to grow back over the divot.
- 3. Ball marks on the green: In my opinion, this is the MOST IMPORTANT thing golfers can do to make the golf course the most playable. Whenever we hit a golf shot onto the green the golf ball will leave a dent, or "ball mark." If we fix the mark as soon as we get to the green, it will heal within a day or two, leaving a nice smooth putting surface behind. If we leave that ball mark untouched for just 24 hours it takes up to two weeks to heal. AVGC has some of the best greens around, so please help maintain them by fixing your ball marks, and any others that you see.

- 4. Warnings- FORE: When golfers hit a shot off line and the ball is heading in the general direction of other individuals, loudly yell FORE as a warning so they can protect themselves from the incoming ball. Just as important, when you hear the word FORE turn away from where the sound is coming from and cover your head. Please don't look in the direction of the sound.
- 5. Courtesy: When on a golf course, you are responsible for your actions. You are there to have fun, and so is everyone else. Sometimes things happen that are out of your control. Using common sense, courtesy and understanding when dealing with others can go a long way.
- Pace of play: This is an issue everywhere golf is played. Always play without delay and <u>keep up with the group in front of</u> you. Golfers should strive to play 18



holes in 4 to 4 1/2 hours. Keep in mind that a golf course is like a highway: if a car slows down in front, everyone behind gets backed up. If you find that you are holding up the group behind you, please let them play through.



Use of Bermuda improving course conditions daily Nick Hanson, Apple Valley Golf Course Superintendent Class-A

Golfers are enjoying the firm dormant conditions the course always provides this time of year. However, players may have noticed that the course looks different compared to previous winters.

The overall look of the golf course indicates that our efforts to reestablish the Bermuda grass in the spring and summer are working. This was the variety of grass the golf course was originally built with, and greatly reduces the cool weather grasses in the fairways and roughs.

This was done for several reasons. First, we wanted a turf that would be able to provide great playing conditions without a lot of extra care or higher cost of maintenance. Second, we needed a turf that would withstand the heat in the summer without requiring extra water to grow and stay green. Finally, we wanted a turf that would recover quickly and fill in the fairways and other areas of the golf course.

We have had only two full growing seasons since we made the decision to go with Bermuda grass and, to date, the vast majority





of the turf in the fairways and roughs have been established with Bermuda grass. We used less water in 2011 versus 2010, and had fewer fairway dry spots requiring extra irrigation during the hot summer days, proving it was a wise decision to go with this type of grass. One side effect of a warm season turf grass like Bermuda is that the turf goes into a state of dormancy if soil temperatures drop below 55 degrees, or air temperatures below 75 degrees. The turf is still alive but it loses its color during colder conditions. No amount of watering will cause it to remain green. The extra water would just promote weeds and create poor playing conditions on the course. With our results to this point, we will have even more of the course established with Bermuda by next fall and the conditions will continue to improve all year long.

Safe Routes to School

The Town was recently awarded a grant of \$359,000 as part of the Federal Safe Routes To School (SRTS). The news was quite gratifying, as only four in ten applications statewide were successful. The funds will be used to improve the south side of Yucca Loma Road between Rancherias and Tamiani roads. Power poles will be removed, and sidewalk, curb and gutter will be improved or installed, providing easier access for students walking or riding their bikes to school. In partnership with the Paul Swick Family Center at Yucca Loma Elementary School, and Healthy Apple Valley, part of the grant will be used for education, to encourage more students to walk and bike ride.

Previously the Town has received SRTS funds to improve areas around Desert Knolls Elementary and what is now the Phoenix Academy.

Bear Valley Bike Lane

To facilitate travel to and from Victor Valley College, the Town also received funding



from the San Bernardino Association of Governments to develop a bike lane from Reata Road to VVC. Originally envisioned to be built alongside the existing bridge, it was determined that some widening and improvements need to be made to the bridge overall. However, improved bike lanes will be added from Reata Road to the Mojave River, then from the west edge of the river to the VVC campus.

Code Enforcement offers Graffiti Abatement Program

The Town offers an exceptional graffiti removal service town-wide.

This free paint-matched removal program eliminates the eyesore of graffiti and preserves the integrity of existing surfaces.

When graffiti is reported, a Code Enforcement Officer confirms the violation. If we have a waiver from the property owner on file, permitting the contractor to enter the property, the graffiti is quickly removed. If not, we send a waiver to the property owner to sign and return to keep on file.

If they prefer not to sign a waiver, the graffiti is treated as a normal Code Enforcement violation and the property owner is required to remove it within a specified time frame.

Anyone observing graffiti in progress should immediately call 9-1-1. If possible, provide the police with a description of the participants, vehicle description (if any) and license plate number.

Graffiti observed on public or private property may be reported as any other violation to the Division at (760) 240-7560. •

Did you know?

Code Enforcement handled 2,898 graffiti cases in 2011. Of these, 90% were proactive and 10% were reactive. Graffiti cases accounted for 35% of the 8,378 cases opened last year.

Mandatory commercial waste recycling law begins

Beginning July 1, all businesses, commercial enterprises, public agencies and schools that generate four or more cubic yards of waste per week, and all multi-family dwellings with five or more units are required by a new state law to participate in mandatory commercial waste recycling.

Recycling containers actually cost less than the same size trash container. Adding recycling container could allow businesses to reduce the size or quantity of trash containers used, or the number of times they are serviced per week, saving money throughout the vear.

Participating properties have until June 1, 2012 to set up a recycling account with AVCO Disposal, Inc. Companies have the option to set up an independent recycling program, but must provide acceptable proof of ongoing recycling to the Town, including reports detailing the weight of waste generated, the weight of recycling materials diverted from the waste stream, and the location to which the recycled materials were sent.



Each city is tasked with monitoring the program within its own boundaries, reporting the statistics to the state, and tracking businesses that are out of compliance with the regulation, according to Assembly Bill 341, which became law on January 1, 2012.
