RECOMMENDED ACTION:

For good cause shown, and finding a waiver will serve a public purpose, approve the waiver of the Facility Rental Fee of \$70.40.

SUMMARY:

The Autism Society of the Inland Empire is establishing a High Desert Chapter and would like to use a meeting room at the James Woody Community Center to provide free services and resources to individuals and families affected by Autism. They are requesting use of the Arts and Crafts Room on Saturday, August 24th, September 21st, October 12th and November 23rd from 2 – 4 pm.

BACKGROUND:

On 8-14-01, the Town Council adopted a policy stating fees can be administratively waived for a local public agency, a utility company or service district, or a similar entity providing an essential service to the general community, whereas, non-profit requests for fee waivers must go before the Town Council for consideration.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Although there is not an ongoing demand that is displaced with this request, the waiving of these fees will result in the loss of potential revenue in the amount of \$70.40.

We are so excited to working with the town of Apple Valley in conjunction with our new support group for families with children with autism.

As reported by Easter Kaiser Permanente, 1 in 75 is diagnosed with Autism In Southern Ca. Autism is a lifelong diagnosis; there is no reported cure only proposed forms of diagnosis management across the lifespan.

The most prominent shared symptom of Autism is a difficulty with social communication (taking another's perspective, conversation, eye contact, etc.). Fortunately, with adequate interventions, through various modes of treatment, as well as, community support, people with autism can also learn coping skills to help them manage their difficulties and even build on their unique strengths.

Both "high functioning" and "low functioning" autism can be challenging parents, not to mention, overwhelming for the entire family.
