

Grant provides free medical sharps containers

Town of Apple Valley.

Thanks to a grant from CalRecycle, Apple Valley residents have another way to safely dispose of their used medical sharps.

The grant provided 780 sharps containers that are available Monday through Friday from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Apple Valley Fire Station 331 located at 22400 Headquarters Drive.

"The Town also offers a sharps container exchange every Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at our household hazardous waste collection site," said Joseph Moon, special projects manager. "This grant offers our residents a weekday option to make responsible disposal of their medical sharps more convenient."

The household hazardous waste collection site is located at 13450 Nomwaket Road between Powhatan and Ottawa roads in Apple Valley. Additionally, sharps containers are exchanged at the Jess Ranch Fire Station #337 between 8:30 and 9:30 a.m. on Mondays.

Sharps must be in approved containers to be collected with a completed information form. Once collected, the full sharps container is placed in a confidential and secure collection box that is picked up and disposed of by the San Bernardino County Fire Hazardous Waste Division.

"Used sharps are a hazard if they are not properly disposed. They should never be thrown in the trash, placed in a unapproved container or haphazardly discarded," said Moon. "Disposing of sharps in an approved container and at an approved disposal site will help prevent accidental punctures and will keep used or unwanted sharps out of the wrong hands." Ò

VETERANS' AID & ATTENDANCE PENSION PROGRAM

Are You A Veteran **Or Surviving Spouse?**

The VA designed this program to help Veterans and their surviving spouses receive the financial support necessary to ensure their continuing care in an Assisted Living setting. The Aid and Attendance Pension provides benefits to Veterans and their surviving spouses. The program can provide up to \$1732.00 for a veteran, \$1113.00 per month to a surviving spouse, or \$2054.00 per month to a couple.

Eligibility Requirements

- Veteran must have served at least 90 days of active duty, with a least one day served during a time of war.
- Assets must be less than \$80,000. (Assets do not include your personal residence, car).
- Financial need in general, there must be less income yearly than the cost of care provided.
- Medical diagnosis You must have a medical condition indicating that you are in need of assistance from others in order to live a quality life, including, but not limited to the following:

 - Walking Bathing Dressing Meal Preparation
 - Medication Assistance
 - Getting out of bed

Help Apple Valley provide "A Better Way of Life" for equestrians

A Better Way of Life.



Not everyone is aware of the hazards that horseback riders face every time they slip out of their gate for a ride in the neighborhood. Horses, like people, can have bad days. Wind, dogs, trash and plastic bags can be the nemesis of many horses. Even a few horses that usually seem fearless have days when they decide that the potted plant in the front of the mailbox is the most terrifying thing they have

ever encountered. Compound that with any medical issue such as a sore mouth, upset stomach, hoof pain or aching limb and even the most compliant horse could pose a danger to its rider.

To create a safer, more enjoyable environment for equestrian enthusiasts, as well as joggers and hikers, the Town's Equestrian Advisory Committee (EAC) has developed a multi-use trail system that draws outdoor hobbyists from all over the Victor Valley. Most riders



avoid crossing streets or riding along heavily traveled roads. However, sometimes they have to travel them for a short distance until they reach the next easement or trail head. Although accidents are less likely to occur with experienced, knowledgeable riders, unforeseen elements and, in some cases, malicious intent can spook horses. The Apple Valley Equestrian Advisory Committee asks residents to follow these simple guidelines when near horses and riders out on our Town's trail system:

- Remember that horses are animals and can be unpredictable
- Give riders your respect and consideration
- Ask before approaching a horse and rider
- When a horse and rider are crossing the street, give them a buffer between your car or bike
- If you see a horse next to the road, slow down or give them distance before you pass them
- Enjoy the sight and a little bit of our heritage

The same general guidelines can be applied to bicyclists, joggers, and other outdoor enthusiasts. Following these simple but important "rules of engagement" will allow enthusiasts the respect and consideration that they deserve. \check{O}


Jacqueline Bounce, the Caregiver Chairperson for the Apple Valley Relay for Life

opened as a public golf course. The Town closed escrow and became the owner of the facility in August of 2011.





This year's airshow will feature several aerobatic pilots: John Collver in "Wardog" the T-6, "Dr. D" Old Time Aerobatics in his Taylorcraft, Rob Harrison "The Tumbling Bear" in his Zlin, Margie Stivers and Marion Wagner wing walkers with Silver Wings Wingwalking demo team in a Stearman biplane, and Tim Just flying the Extra.

Other favorites expected to be on hand include Rich Piccirilli with Just In Time Skydivers, radio control airplanes and the N-9M Flying Wing. On display will be warbirds such as the F4U Corsair, P-38 Lightning, B-25 Mitchell, P-51 Mustang, P-40 Warhawk, Fw190, all from Planes of Fame Air Museum to name a few.



It's going to be a chili day in the High Desert as the Rotary Club of Apple Valley teams up with the Town of Apple Valley and Victorville Motors to present the 12th Annual Happy Trails Chili Cook-Off on Saturday, October 19.

The location at Lenny Brewster Sports Center offers easy access, plenty of parking, a playground and lots of room for activities for the whole family. The park is at 21024 Otoe Road. Gates are open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.,

with the best chili selection between 11am and 2pm. Chili tasting can be extremely limited later in the afternoon.

A car show was added a few years ago, and continues to grow. Bring out your classic cars and hot rods and enjoy a full day of fun, with all grass parking. "As a regional qualifying event for the World Championship, the Happy Trails Chili Cook Off is like the wildcard round leading up to the World Series," explained Kathie Martin, event chair. "A 'Community Cook' division is also available for local clubs, businesses and restaurants.
