The Town of Apple Valley has become an expert on bridging gaps in our 25 years of incorporation. From bridging our past to the present, from goals to reality, from challenge to success. We create a vision. We set a goal. We build a bridge to get us there.

In August, Mayor Art Bishop presented the State of the Town address at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon. With the theme of "Building Bridges," the Town highlighted progress on the Yucca Loma Bridge, as well as our success in bridging funding gaps through grants.

We were just recommended for \$990,000 through a Safe Routes to School grant to build a sidewalk, bike path and traffic signal on Yucca Loma Road between Apple Valley Road and the river, serving students of Rio Vista Elementary. We also expect to receive \$1 million to build a 2-mile stretch of the Riverwalk project, from Bear Valley Road to Tussing Ranch along the Jess Ranch and Sun City developments.

Apple Valley's economy saw a 3.9% increase in sales tax revenue over the same time last year. However, our per capita revenue of \$75 per person is fourth out of the five High Desert cities. What this means is that we still experience sales tax leakage when citizens spend their tax dollars elsewhere. It's more important than ever to shop local. If you can FIND it in Apple Valley, BUY it in Apple Valley!



RIGHT TO VOTE

Election Day is Tuesday, November 4. If you are a citizen and not registered to vote, you may pick up a voter registration form at the Town Clerk's Office and mail or return it in person to the San Bernardino County Elections Office no later than October 20.

There are three voting options:

1. VOTE EARLY

The San Bernardino County Elections Office offers early voting for those unable to cast their ballot on election day. Check with the Apple Valley Town Clerk's office for upcoming dates, locations, and hours.

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2. VOTE BY MAIL

Registered voters may request to vote by mail for one election or permanently. Return ballots by 8 p.m. on election day by:

- Mailing via the U.S. Postal Service.
- Delivering to the San Bernardino County library, Town Clerk's office, or the San Bernardino Elections Office during regular business hours.
- Delivering to any San Bernardino County polling place on Election Day.

3. VOTE ON ELECTION DAY

Cast your ballot from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. To find your polling place:

- Use the Polling Place and Sample Ballot Look-up Tool at www.sbcountyelections.com.
- Refer to the back of your Voter Information Guide and Sample Ballot.

WATER SAVING MANDATES

The California State Water Resources Control Board (CSWRCB) recently implemented a series of new regulations intended to help prevent water waste. Here in Apple Valley these regulations have been part of our Municipal Code since 1990, in acknowledgement of our desert environment. **The four rules are:**


- 1) No excessive runoff will be permitted
- 2) All car washing must be done with a self-closing nozzle
- 3) No applications of water to driveways or other hard surfaces
- 4) No using potable water in a water feature such as a fountain unless the water is recirculated

We encourage our citizens to follow these practices. You may report excessive run-off by calling Apple Valley Code Enforcement at (760) 240-7560.

Along with these new mandatory regulations there are others things we can do to become good stewards of our limited water resources. Most of our water is used outdoors and there are many things that can be done to reduce consumption including the following suggestions: Program your irrigation timer to water during the hours of 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. Watering during cooler hours reduces the amount of moisture lost to evaporation. Place two to three inches of mulch around your plants to help the soil below retain moisture. Convert your watering system to drip irrigation to reduce water runoff.

Another step is to reduce water intensive plants by landscaping with desert adaptive plants that require less water. Consider removing your lawn and other water-thirsty plants. The Mojave Water Agency (MWA) sponsors Cash for Grass. When funding is made available by your water service provider, you can receive \$0.50 per square foot in rebates for all turf that you remove. S.H.O.C.K. PROGRAM Offered Regionally

Understanding the positive impact the program has made on Apple Valley youth, San Bernardino County First District Supervisor Robert Lovingood has helped sponsor the expansion of the S.H.O.C.K. Program, a paramilitary intervention program for atrisk youth.

S.H.O.C.K. stands for Self discipline-Honor-Obedience-Character-Knowledge. The program has been offered to Apple Valley teenagers by the Apple Valley Police Activities League twice per year since its inception in 2007 to combat the negative influences of drugs, gangs, teenage pregnancy and communication issues.

For the first time, with the support of Supervisor Lovingood, S.H.O.C.K. will be available to children from Victorville, Hesperia, Adelanto and the county areas of the Victor Valley.

"The goal of this regional approach is to expose the other communities to the benefits of S.H.O.C.K. and to encourage the development of a similar program in other areas of the Victor Valley," said Apple Valley Police Captain Lana Tomlin.

The latest session began on September 8. Participants attend evening classes three nights a week for 10 weeks. Sessions offer a combination of classroom instruction and physical activity designed to promote teamwork and improve impulse control. Guest speakers have included doctors, detectives, local business professionals, members of the San Bernardino County coroner, probation and sheriffs offices, as well as the Apple Valley gang unit.

As part of the program, parents are required to participate in the mandatory "Parent Project" that equips them with tools to meet the challenges of raising children in today's world.

START SMART CLASSES Teach Teens Responsible Driving

Help instill your teen with knowledge and confidence behind the wheel by signing them up for the Apple Valley Police Department's Start Smart driving class. Designed by the California Highway Patrol, sessions are scheduled monthly and are available to teens and an accompanying parent at no cost.

The two-hour class covers important issues such as:

- Tips to avoid collisions
- Safe driving habits
- Dynamics of a collision
- Consequences of a poor choice behind the wheel of a vehicle
- Testimonies of people tragically impacted by incidents involving teen drivers
- Parental roles and responsibilities
- Legal ramifications and civil liabilities affecting teen drivers and their parents

The Aid and Attendance Pension provides benefits to Veterans and their surviving spouses. The program can provide up to \$1732.00 for a veteran, \$1113.00 per month to a surviving spouse, or \$2054.00 per month to a couple.

Eligibility Requirements

- Veteran must have served at least 90 days of active duty, with a least one day served during a time of war.
- Assets must be less than \$80,000. (Assets do not include your personal residence, car).
- Financial need in general, there must be less income yearly than the cost of care provided.
- Medical diagnosis You must have a medical condition indicating that you are in need of assistance from others in order to live a quality life, including, but not limited to the following:
 - Walking Bathing
 - Dressing Meal Preparation
 - Medication Assistance
 - Getting out of bed


DECEMBER 13

HEALTHY APPLE VALLEY

Provides Exercise and Nutrition Options

When it comes to health and wellness, the Town of Apple Valley believes in the old adage "where there's a will there's a way." Instead of lamenting the lack of sidewalks that offer residents the opportunity to walk their way to good health, the Town has put together a series of programs and park improvements that residents can use to keep themselves active.

"Through the First 5 Grant we are teaching a series of Mommy and Me nutrition classes geared for children 5 and under," said Recreation Supervisor Lena Quinonez. "We are working with parents to teach them nutrition, meal planning and how active play can be healthy for their children."

One of the ways we are educating the public about healthy play is through our VanTastic Program. The mobile play van visits parks or schools in low-income areas accessible to families within walking distance and averages 40 participants a day. Fifty minutes of structured, active play is followed by a healthy snack and water. Quinonez said, "We are reaching families that may normally not be active or participate in recreation activities."

The use of improved amenities at Civic Center Park also lends itself to a more active lifestyle. Our residents and neighbors are taking advantage of increased lighting, walking paths with distance indicators, restrooms, the dog park and built-in exercise equipment, just to name a few.

"This equipment gives park patrons an opportunity to engage in exercise without a gym membership or pass to a dance studio," said Quinonez, who noted that there are plans for additional active use amenities in our park system. "We also continue to advertise Brewster and Horsemen's Center as walking locations."

Recreation programs are created with health and wellness in mind, for example, Zumba classes, 5-10K runs, Heart Games and the Reverse Triathlon. The Town Council has also adopted other policies focused on health and wellness, most noticeably no smoking in the parks.

Apple Valley is not alone in their efforts to increase health and wellness in our community. As a member of the regional Healthy Cities coalition, Apple Valley partners with other High Desert Cities to improve lives all over the area.





Taste your way through champion and community cooks, as the Rotary Club of Apple Valley teams up again with the Town of Apple Valley and Victorville Motors to present this popular event on Saturday, October 18.

An expanded Fall Festival area for families will feature more inflatables and "Paint A Truck" – where kids of all ages can take a paintbrush to an actual pick-up truck. Cost is \$5 per adult, with kids 10 and under free if they are not tasting. Paid admission includes a tasting kit with ballots to vote for the People's Choice.

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GETTING OUR WATER TO FLOW

in the Right Direction

If the guy who owns your duplex lives on the other side of your wall, you know whose door to knock on when you have a plumbing problem. But if the owner is in another town, or state – or country – the process isn't so simple.

This is one reason the Town of Apple Valley is looking to acquire the Apple Valley Ranchos Water Company, to provide local control and accountability for our citizens. Currently, corporate profits flow right out of our community and into the deep pockets of the Carlyle Group in

Washington, D.C. This "return on investment" is embedded in our water rates – rates that have increased a staggering 112% in the past 10 years.

If the Town acquires AVRWC, the people who benefit from water rates are our own residents because any "profits" are reinvested back into the system.

Ratepayers have asked whether the Town of Apple Valley has the expertise and resources to own and run a water company. It does. Key senior managers have spent the majority of their careers in the water industry, gaining critical operational and financial know-how that will serve the Town well. In addition, most of the current employees of the water company – our friends and neighbors – will keep their jobs if they want them and continue to provide quality service.

A financial feasibility study completed earlier this year states that "the operation of the utility under public ownership will be less expensive because of the elimination of profit, various taxes and other expenses incorporated into the current rate structure."

The study also says that capital costs will be reduced through the town's ability to issue tax-exempt bonds and use low interest State Revolving Fund (SRF) loans to fund any new capital improvements.

The residents of Apple Valley also deserve open transparency from their water purveyor. In the state regulated utility structure, this simply does not exist. Under Town ownership, all records – including ratemaking details and budgets– will be open and available for public review.

Affordable water is imperative to our Town's present and future prosperity. Local control will bring accountability for all rate-payers and taxpayers.
