RECOMMENDED ACTION:

That the Town Council approve the following list of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) funding priorities, as established in the Strategic Plan, to be used as a guideline by the Community Development Citizens Advisory Committee (CDCAC) in making recommendations to the Town Council for the 2015-2016 Action Plan.

5 YEAR CONSOLIDATED PLAN 2012-2016, PRIORITY NEEDS RANKED FOR 2015-2016 4TH YEAR ACTION PLAN BASED ON COMMUNITY INPUT (EXCEPT PUBLIC SERVICE)

<u>RANK</u>

- 1. Expand the economic base and promote greater employment opportunities for residents.
- 2. Create safer, more attractive and more accessible neighborhoods and stimulate economic growth through the improvement of infrastructure.
- 3. Provision of public facilities and park improvements.
- 4. Preserve the existing housing stock.
- 5. Eliminate blighted conditions and substandard housing through enhanced code enforcement activities and demolition.
- 6. Provide shelter and related services to meet the needs of the homeless population and support the development of a continuum of care system on a region-wide basis.
- 7. Assist special needs persons with reducing housing costs and with meeting their rehabilitation needs.

- 8. Increase affordable homeownership opportunities.

SUMMARY:

Since the initial adoption of the first Town of Apple Valley Five-Year Consolidated Plan in 1997, the Town Council has established the practice of setting annual priorities to be used as a guideline for funding recommendations outlined in each year's Action Plan. Due to the formation of the HOME Consortium, the priorities established now will provide direction for both CDBG as well as HOME funded activities.

Pursuant to CDBG regulations, all projects must meet one (1) of three (3) national objectives set forth by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD): (1) Benefit low and moderate income households; (2) Aid in the elimination/prevention of slum and blight, or (3) Meet an urgent need. Pursuant to HOME regulations, HOME funds are specifically focused on affordable housing activities and may be used to develop and support affordable rental housing and homeownership opportunities.

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Recommended projects for funding should be consistent with addressing the needs identified, and priority strategy developed in each five-year Consolidated Plan.

It is now appropriate for the Council to establish a list of priorities to be used as a guideline for funding CDBG and HOME projects during the 2015-2016 program year. Each year's Action Plan priorities should be consistent with the priorities established in the Five-Year Strategic Plan. Based upon the foregoing, staff recommends adoption of the form motion.

BACKGROUND:

The priorities identified in the 2012-2016 Five-Year Consolidated Plan are summarized below:

- 1. Preserve the existing housing stock.
- 2. Expand the supply of affordable housing.
- 3. Assist in reducing housing costs for extremely low- and low-income households.
- 4. Assist special needs persons with reducing housing costs and with meeting their rehabilitation needs.
- 5. Increase affordable homeownership opportunities.
- 6. Eliminate blighted conditions and substandard housing through enhanced code enforcement activities and demolition.
- 7. Provide shelter and related services to meet the needs of the homeless population and support the development of a continuum of care system on a region-wide basis.
- 8. Affirmatively further fair housing to ensure equal access to housing for lower income, ethnic minorities and special needs groups.
- 9. Coordinate public and private efforts to reduce lead-based paint hazards and protect young children.
- 10. Create safer, more attractive and more accessible neighborhoods and stimulate economic growth through the improvement of infrastructure.
- 11. Provision of public facilities and park improvements.
- 12. Address public service needs.
- 13. Expand the economic base and promote greater employment opportunities for residents.

Although the Town has made progress in meeting some of the priorities established in the current Five-Year Consolidated Plan, it is far from addressing all of the needs identified. In particular, HUD requires cities to substantially address priorities outlined in their five-year housing strategy. Existing state requirements also create a need to develop more affordable housing.

On November 12, 2014, a consultation meeting was held to solicit input from non-profit entities and service providers as to the housing and community development needs of our community. Further, the goal was to establish collaborations between service providers and to coordinate multi-area funded projects/proposals with the participating

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jurisdictions. The service providers discussed the need for collaboration to address more basic core needs rather than only focus on the apparent problems and their remedies. Areas of concern included transitional housing, job creation, job readiness training, career oriented education, public transportation, business participation and growth and volunteerism. Future funding may be requested for multi-entity programs. The attending non-profit agencies and service providers discussed need to organize and plan project/programs in collaboration that can leverage federal funds with other sources.

On November 18, 2014, a public hearing was held to solicit input from residents of the community regarding housing and community development needs. Outreach and invitations to the public hearing were initiated in early September and ongoing in conjunction with other Consolidated Plan activities. Public noticing, press releases, social media, email correspondence, hard copy placement and phone calls were utilized. There were two public comments offered at this meeting, one during public comments and one during the public hearing. Input included the need for the availability of public transportation during evening and early morning shifts, food services, shelter and counseling for addictions.

The Consolidated Plan Community Needs Survey distribution and online placement began on October 1, 2014, with a due date for submittals of November 20, 2014. The surveys were available at an online site (Survey Monkey) in an easily usable format as well as electronically and in hard copy. The outreach for the survey included electronic correspondence to local non-profits, networking organizations and churches requesting distribution to their clients and constituents. Social media was utilized to announce availability through press releases, website postings, Facebook and Twitter. Hard copies were available at Civic Center locations. 187 respondents have completed the Needs Survey.

The Consolidated Plan Community Needs Survey (ATTACHMENT C) asked respondents to rank the community needs identified in the 2012-2016 Consolidated Plan based on their level of importance: 0-not important through 3-very important. Priority Needs tallied average scores of 2- important, none were 'not important' (see ATTACHMENT B- survey results). Most needs scored from 1.5 – 2.6. Because all needs categories have been identified as having some level of importance based on community input, they were ranked (ATTACHMENT A- Score and Rank) and it is recommended to include all needs as priorities in the planning and development of the 2015-2016 Fourth Year Action Plan. The CDCAC will be directed to consider ranking in the scoring of submitted applications for 2015-2016 CDBG and HOME funding.

The anticipated CDBG allocation for 2015-2016 is \$578,801.00, based upon last year's formula allocation. The estimated HOME Consortium allocation for 2014-2015 is \$483,072.00. Apple Valley and Victorville share in the HOME Consortium allocation and will receive an estimated \$198,543.00 and \$284,529.00, respectively. These funding estimates are based on 2014-2015 allocations and will be updated in the Spring 2015

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when final HUD allocations are announced. Provision of funding estimates at this time is simply for perspective of anticipated funding.


