# **Sunset Concert Series**

These scenes play out over and over again at the Sunset Concert Series, now entering its 10th season in Apple Valley.

This award-winning music series traces its roots back to 2003, with a monthly "Jazz Night Street Fair" that featured a car show and live entertainment held in the parking lot of Town Hall.

In 2007, Sunset Concerts launched as an event held once a month from June to September in the newly opened Civic Center Park.

Today, the series has evolved to become the best place to be Thursday nights in the summer. It has been named one of the "Best of the Desert" live entertainment events by readers of the Daily Press for five years and people flock from well-beyond our Town borders to hear bands ranging from southern rock to country and from oldies to '80s.

Julie Gilmer, the Town's event coordinator since 2006, summed up the impact, "We are providing an opportunity for people to establish traditions with family and friends. We are making memories for a generation. We offer a chance to connect with each other over live music, and disconnect from the stress of everyday life."

We are excited to have Heritage Victor Valley Medical Group as our presenting sponsor for the third year in a row. Hometown favorites Phat Cat Swinger will kick things off on June 23 from 6 to 9 p.m., followed by the Annual Freedom Festival at Brewster Park then six more weeks of live music.

The Sunset Concert Series features food vendors, a beer garden, live music and dancing. Concert goers should bring blankets or portable chairs, but leave your pets at home as they are not allowed in the concert venue. Smoking of all types is prohibited in all Town parks, including at our concerts.

Civic Center Park is adjacent to Apple Valley Town Hall and across from Super Target in the Apple Valley Commons shopping center. Parking and admission are free. 

Program helps resident remain in his home

When Michael Annese moved in 1994 from Northridge to Apple Valley, his new 2-bedroom 2-bath home in Jess Ranch was the perfect picture of tranquility. During his 22 years in the community, he volunteered for the Jess Ranch Association, assisted in delivering flyers and newsletters, and took an active part in many of the Jess Ranch activities.

"Michael's joyous personality was felt throughout the community as he delivered little boxes of candy to show his gratitude to those he interacted with," said Silvia Caraballo, Program Assistant in the Town's Housing Division. "Friends and neighbors have been captivated by Michael's enormous heart, and watched over him to ensure his well being."

Naturally, these neighbors were concerned when his property fell into disrepair beyond what the 87-year-old could address. Fortunately, a few months ago, Mr. Annese reached out to the Town of Apple Valley for assistance. With the help of a 0% interest deferred Residential Rehabilitation Loan, Moses Ferrell Construction painted the home, installed new flooring, provided an ADA accessible toilet. installed smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, and replaced his dishwasher, countertops and sink.

"We were able to return his home to a safe and warm environment, so he can continue to live comfortably in his home," said Housing and Community Development Specialist Christopher Moore.

During the rehabilitation process, Town staff noticed that Michael lacked many basic household items and supplies. The Housing and

Community Development staff collected donations and were able to provide Michael with a bed, small appliances, home décor, bath items, kitchenware, stationery, cleaning supplies and much more.

There are many residents whose homes are in need of things like a new roof, heating and air systems, and new floors. They may have health and safety issues or problems with accessibility. The Housing and Community Development Department offers loans to address these type of issues for low-income individuals or families. The loans require no monthly payments as long as the homeowner resides on the property. Moore said, "We enjoy serving our community and these funds allow us to do exactly that."

The Town of Apple Valley administers two low-income loan programs. The Residential Rehabilitation Loan Program (RRLP) provides loans of up to \$20,000 for repair work on single-family owner occupied homes. The loans feature 0% interest, deferred for a maximum of 30 years (subject to terms and conditions). The Manufactured Home Repair Program (MHRP) provides loans of up to \$10,000 for repair work to owner-occupied manufactured homes. Both loans are available for qualified low income homeowners within the Town's boundaries. All participants are required to execute a loan agreement and provide required documentation for loan underwriting.

# CAT COLUNY Gets A Cozy Makeover

When you sell your home, you make it look as inviting and homey as possible. When you sell your car, you detail it first to present it in the best possible light. Local Girl Scout Kayla Engeron had these tips in mind when she proposed to remodel one of the cat colonies at the Apple Valley Animal Shelter. By making the space more attractive, the 15-year-old sophomore hopes to increase the cat adoption rate.

"Far too many cats are being overlooked at the shelter and must be euthanized because the shelter simply runs out of space," said Kayla, who has volunteered in the Me and My Shadow program at the shelter for six years. "I think many more cats would be adopted if they have a brighter, more inviting adoption room to live in so I wanted to do something about that."

Under the supervision of Animal Services Supervisor Kristin Hall, Kayla penciled out some designs and gathered a team of helpers to bring her plan to life. The collaborative effort resulted in a more cheerful space complete with a sky bridge that connects three artificial turf covered lounging platforms, a stairway to the sky bridge made out of strategically placed shelves, a custom made bench positioned right underneath the viewing window and a tiered structure of cat hammocks sewn by Hall.

"The cats seem really happy with it and it is getting a lot more attention from the public," said Hall.

For Kayla, the project came with an added bonus. Her efforts earned her a Gold Award, which is the highest recognition a Girl Scout can achieve. However, she isn't stopping with just one room. To give as many cats as possible a chance at finding a forever home, she will continue to remodel the remaining rooms as funding becomes available. ### Rabies Vaccination Clinics and Special Events Scheduled



The animal shelter is located at 22131 Powhatan Road just east of Quinnault Road. Vaccinations, licensing, adoptions and more will be offered at this year's Paws N' Claws Pet Fair on October 22. Vaccination pricing ranges from \$6 to \$15. Low-income families may also qualify.

The pet fair is one of several special events the shelter hosts to increase awareness about responsible pet ownership and raise funds to help defray the cost of adoptions, micro chips, medical expenses and more. Master Plan Process to Begin

For some parents, sending their children off to school is a source of worry...not because they feel the school is unsafe, but the route they walk or bike to get there can be challenging. The Town of Apple Valley understands these concerns and has secured a state grant that will improve transportation routes for students traveling to and from school.

"One of the primary goals of AVUSD is student safety, said Janet Gould, Apple Valley Unified School District Risk Management Director. "The goal of this project is to reduce traffic dangers that prevent children from walking or biking to school safely, and expand the safe environment at our schools out onto the surrounding roads."

The first step is to evaluate the specific needs for each location and create a master plan of the improvement options available. The grant does not provide construction funding, however, it will allow an assessment of 10 K-8 grade schools. The findings will help staff determine solutions that will enable more students to safely walk or ride their bike to class.

"We invite parents to take an active role in helping identify concerns and provide input, as we work together to ensure safer routes to school for our students and families," said Gould, noting that all families of students in grades kindergarten through 8th grade will be receiving letters explaining the input process.

A Safe Routes to Schools Coalition will steer the planning process through the coming months. The group consists of school representatives, AVUSD staff, Town engineering staff, and school police officials. A safety audit of the 10 target schools is underway under the direction of the KOA Corporation, the planning and engineering consultants who were chosen to manage the project. Once the safety audits are complete, KOA will use the information to propose infrastructure upgrades aimed at protecting the pedestrians and bicyclists on their way to and from school.

"Caltrans has provided us with an excellent opportunity," said Rich Berger, Project Manager in the Town's engineering department. "This project brings together our Town, our schools and, most importantly, our residents to protect our community's most valuable asset - our children. The parents will have an active voice in this process which is critical to its success."

This planning effort will position Apple Valley for a number of funding opportunities in the future for construction of the infrastructure near our schools. The Town was one of only 50 applicants selected to receive a portion of the \$9.8 million in fundina.

# PROTECT

### **Your Property and Your Identity**

Several areas of Apple Valley have experienced a recent increase in reported thefts from automobile break-ins to mailbox vandalism. Although incidents of forgery and counterfeit were reduced, fraud cases were on the rise in 2015. The Apple Valley Police Department would like to offer some tips to help keep you, your property and identity safe.

- Don't leave valuables visible in your vehicle.
- Secure them in your trunk and out of plain sight.
- Be aware of your surroundings.
- Stay off your cell and be watchful of suspicious circumstances when walking to or from your vehicle.
- Park in well-lit and heavily populated areas when out in the evening hours.
- Be aware of suspicious people approaching you for any reason
- Don't leave your purse, wallet, or cell phones unattended for any amount of time.
- Have your keys in your hand as you approach your vehicle.
- Take extra precautions while using ATM machines.
- Use ATMs in highly populated well-lit areas.
- If your credit/debit card is lost, stolen or misplaced, notify the bank immediately.
- Keep a record of your purchases to avoid fraudulent charges.

When it comes to the mail theft, the Apple Valley Sheriff's Department suggests residents send mail from internal mailboxes at the post office instead of the mail boxes in front of their house, and to use electronic payment methods instead of physical mail to prevent thieves from forging or washing checks.



## "Call if you can - text if you can't"

Members of the community who are hearing-and speech-impaired, or those in a situation where it is too dangerous to dial 9-1-1, have another option to call for help in an emergency – Text-to-9-1-1.

Effective immediately, local San Bernardino County law enforcement and fire agency dispatch centers will be equipped to receive and respond to mobile phone SMS Text-to-9-1-1 messages. This includes the areas within and out of the Town of Apple Valley boundaries. This service is available for use by the deaf, hard-of-hearing, or speech impaired, and in situations where it is too dangerous to make a voice call to 9-1-1.

At this time the four wireless carriers who support the Text-to-911 are AT&T Mobility, Sprint, T-Mobile, and Verizon Wireless. All phones or devic-

es must include a text or data plan to send a Text-to-9-1-1.

The following are the FCC guidelines on how to contact 9-1-1 utilizing the Text-to-9-1-1.

A text or data plan is required. Location accuracy varies by carrier and should not be relied upon. Be prepared to give your location. Text-to-9-1-1 service will not be available if you are roaming or the wireless carrier cannot ascertain a location of the device sending the message. Do not send photos and/or videos, they cannot be received at the 9-1-1 center at this time. Text messages should be sent in English only and not contain popular abbreviations or emojis, which will not be recognized.

As always, 9-1-1 in any form, voice call or Text-to-9-1-1 is to be used only in the event of an emergency.

# APPLE VALLEY LEGACY MUSEUM

### First Anniversary Hoedown

When the Apple Valley Inn opened for business as a hotel and restaurant on Thanksgiving Day in 1948, it had 36 guest rooms scattered over 28 acres, but there were no phones on which patrons could call to order room service. Instead, they wrote their orders on a slip of paper and sent it by way of a carrier pigeon that was provided for each cottage.

A replica of the pigeon coops, photos from the Apple Valley Inn's thriving era and many more artifacts about Apple Valley in general are all on display at the Apple Valley Legacy Museum, located in the old Bob Hope Cottage #153 at the Historic Apple Valley Inn.

The museum is one of many businesses that operate out of this historic property, also once known as the Roy Rogers Inn, at 20601 Highway 18 at the end of Dale Evans Parkway. The museum sits right below the historic Hilltop House.

The free, non-profit museum is supported through the High Desert Community Foundation and is staffed by volunteers seven days a week. Winter hours are Monday through Saturday 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Sunday noon to 6 p.m. Many local citizens and organizations have loaned or donated collections of vintage postcards, news articles, photos, books, and collectibles including Terri Lee Dolls, Roy and Dale memorabilia, items from the fire department, library, dairy, ranches, movie star and celebrity visitors, and much more.

The museum is supported by the Town of Apple Valley, the Apple Valley Chamber of Commerce, the Happy Trails Children's Foundation, the Roy Rogers family, and many others. The museum will mark its one-year anniversary with a western hoedown on March 31 at 4:30 p.m. The event will include a live band, square-dancing and food. ### YUCCA LONA BRIDGE Construction Update

A little paint, some wiring and a bit more concrete is all that remains to finish construction of the Yucca Loma Bridge! Decades of planning and two years of construction have come together to complete the long awaited structure. Speaking of long...at 1,606 feet, it is the longest bridge in the High Desert. It includes two lanes in each direction, a 6-foot barrier-protected sidewalk for foot traffic and a 12-foot barrier-protected bike lane.

The second phase of the overall project along the Yucca Loma corridor is expected to begin in April to widen Yucca Loma Road from two lanes to four lanes, from Apple Valley Road to the bridge. The project will also include sidewalks, a traffic signal at Havasu and the fire station, and a storm drain system.

To improve safety for Rio Vista School of Applied Learning and its surrounding neighborhoods, Yucca Loma Road will be closed and major traffic control operations will be put in place during the street widening. Neighbors will be receiving a letter in the mail, and the information will also be available on the Town's website as well as at Facebook.com/YuccaLomaBridge. We expect to be able to open the bridge in summer 2017 when the Yucca Loma Road widening project is complete.

### LIBRARY TO REOPEN IN TEMPORARY SPACE

The County-owned-and-operated Apple Valley Newton T. Bass Library will reopen for business in temporary space adjacent to the library in time for the June kickoff of the Summer Reading Program. Interconnected modular units will provide 5,000 square feet of library space in the parking lot at 14901 Dale Evans Parkway. Internet access on 23 computers and a large collection of books for adults and children will be available while the library undergoes repairs.

The County has approved \$2.5 million to fully fund repairs to the permanent library, but there is no estimate at this time for when it will reopen. The County library has been closed for 11 months for what seemed like a simple fire sprinkler issue at first, but turned out to be structural issues with the roof.
