## **Engineering a Better Trail System**

As the holidays come and go, some Apple Valley residents may have included getting healthier as one of their New Year resolutions. Walking, biking, and jogging are great ways to do that, and the Town of Apple Valley's engineering department has been hard at work to provide those opportunities.

The Mojave Riverwalk South project began construction in October and, when complete, will provide a 12-foot wide concrete multi-use trail that begins at Bear Valley Road and stretches south 2.75 miles along the Mojave River.

"This will be a gathering place for people to get some exercise and enjoy our beautiful desert," said Deputy Town Engineer Richard Pedersen. "And the location is convenient to our residents as well as neighboring communities." The project is primarily funded by a \$923,000 Active Transportation grant from Southern California Association of Governments.


The Riverwalk is one piece of a growing network of interconnected paths for non-motorized transportation. The Bear Valley Bike Path is under construction

along Bear Valley Road from Reata to Jess Ranch Parkway, and from the Bear Valley Bridge to Fish Hatchery Road. Ultimately, the Bear Valley Bridge rehabilitation project will complete the last section of the path that connects the Town of Apple Valley to Victor Valley College and Victorville's network of paths.

This spring, the Town will upgrade its Class II bikeway network, including resurfacing, striping and adding new signage to portions of the 37-mile route. A new segment is being added as part of the Yucca Loma Road widening, which will provide connection to the bridge when it opens in May. We have also completed a 2-mile stretch along Rincon Road from Navajo to Central.

As the Town's Vision 2020 strategic plan points out, the Town of Apple Valley is committed to developing a safe community, adequate and well-maintained infrastructure, and diverse recreational opportunities. These and other projects currently in development align with the goals of Vision 2020 and create opportunities to build a healthy Apple Valley.

# Could Your Christmas Tree Use A 'PICK ME UP?'

Once the presents are unwrapped and the needles start to drop, it's time to give your Christmas tree a proper retirement. You don't have to haul it off to a local drop-off point or dump it in the desert. Apple Valley residents can simply put their tree by the curb and AVCO Disposal will pick up Christmas trees until January 7 on regular trash service days.

#### There are three simple steps to take:

- 1) Remove all decorations, tinsel and stands
- 2) Cut the tree in half if over 6-feet tall
- 3) Place it curbside on your regular trash service day

The clean trees will be collected for grinding and composting. This practice conserves landfill space and reduces greenhouse gas emissions. Please note that flocked trees cannot be composted, so they will be disposed of as trash. Questions may be directed to AVCO Disposal at (760) 245-8607.

## **MEASURE V**

### **Passes in Apple Valley**

Many residents have contacted Town Hall asking how the passage of Measure V affects the acquisition of the Apple Valley Water System.

In simplest terms, the Liberty Utilities-backed measure will require that voters approve the use of public debt to pay for the acquisition of the system. It is too early to say when that vote will take place. The Town's legal efforts to acquire the system by eminent domain will continue in the meantime.

The Town Council understands the democratic process and respects the outcome. It is important to note that Liberty spent \$400,000 in support of Measure V. The citizens of Apple Valley continue to express dismay over water rates that are well above those of neighboring communities. It is that support from residents that led the Council to pursue acquisition.

It is important to note, too, that the election was not a mandate against public ownership of water, as Liberty has suggested. Liberty, tellingly, never put the question of public ownership on the ballot. It was simply a vote on the process of approving public debt for the acquisition, construction, improvement or financing of an enterprise.



## ERT VOLUNTEERS

### Play Key Role During Blue Cut Fire

When the Blue Cut fire raged through the High Desert last August, our local disaster service workers played an important part in managing the crisis. Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) members volunteered nearly 80 hours at the disaster command post, and in the Emergency Operations Center set up at the Apple Valley Animal Shelter that took in nearly 600 displaced animals. Our Emergency Communications Service workers volunteered 240 hours between the shelter and the Victorville Fairgrounds that temporarily housed additional animals including livestock. We are grateful to these volunteers who dedicate their skills and resources in times of need.

Does helping your community, or being prepared to help yourself and your family in an emergency interest you? Do you know what you would need if you had to evacuate your home? Do you know what you should have in your car for emergencies? Do you have an out of state contact? Come and learn all this and more at our Community Emergency Response Team classes. By completing the class, you are eligible to assist the Town in official emergency response situations.

Our next class will be held on three consecutive Saturdays beginning January 21 at Apple Valley Fire Protection District Station #336, 19235 Yucca Loma Road. You will learn: Emergency Preparedness, Fire Safety, Disaster Medical, Light Search and Rescue, Terrorism, Disaster Psychology, and Cert Organization. ## NO F.O.G. No Clog!

Sewer backups and overflows result in property and environmental damage. They are most commonly caused by improper materials such as fat, oil and grease (FOG) being discharged into the Town sewer system. Since these substances do not dissolve and tend to float on the surface, they build up, collect on the tops and sides of the sewer pipes and eventually cause a blockage and subsequent backup and/or overflow.

Sanitary sewer systems and septic tanks are designed to handle human waste, toilet paper and used water. By following simple guidelines, you can help protect natural waterways, maintain sewer and septic systems and reduce treatment and maintenance costs. Please refer to the following list of DOs & DON'Ts concerning FOG.

#### DO:

- Collect used grease and cooking oil in a container and dispose in the garbage or preferably at a Household Hazardous Waste collection center.
- Put solid waste such as disposable diapers and personal hygiene products in the garbage.
- Place food scraps in the garbage for disposal with solid waste.

#### DON'T:

- Pour grease, fats and oils from cooking down the drain.
- Use the toilet as a garbage can.
- Use the sewer as a means to dispose of food or scraps.



# Gym Named in Honor of MICHAEL H. MARTIN



## Local Teens Get Behind The Scenes Look At Local Government

Should Apple Valley spend money to offer free e-waste pick-up for seniors? Should the Town provide 100 free microchips to pets of senior citizens? These are some of the issues more than 45 local teens debated at the town's Third Annual Mayor's Youth Leadership Conference in November.

Juniors from five Apple Valley high schools were invited to participate in the all-day event that included presentations from department managers, lunch with Town Council members, as well as information on volunteer and internship opportunities. Students also worked in groups to build a case for six proposals then presented them to a mock town council made up of their peers. The mock council listened, questioned and deliberated on how they should spend a \$1,000 budget.

The winning group presented the project at the December Town Council meeting, where funding was officially allocated to the selected project, providing free swim lessons for 55 low income/at-risk youth over spring break.



# PET VACCINE CLINICS OFFERED

There are few better ways to show your pet you love them than to keep them current on their vaccines. Apple Valley Animal Services partners with local veterinary hospitals to offer low-cost vaccines several times a year at the shelter from 5 to 7 p.m.

Rabies vaccines are available for dogs or cats for \$6. Additional vaccines available for dogs are Bordetella for \$10 and DA2PP for \$15. The feline leukemia vaccine will be offered for \$15. 

# APPLE VALLEY CHOICE ENERGY

Offers "A Better Choice"

Apple Valley is making a change for the better starting April 1, 2017. This is when Apple Valley Choice Energy (AVCE) will become the Town's primary energy provider, giving residents and businesses the power to choose lower, stable energy rates, cleaner energy and local control.

AVCE is collaborating with Southern California Edison (SCE) to ensure you receive this cleaner power through SCE's existing lines and just one bill, which includes charges for both AVCE's power and SCE's services. SCE will also maintain the lines and respond to any outages which may occur, as they do now. SO you get the best of both providers: cleaner, more cost-effective power under local control and the convenience of a single source for billing and service requests.

Residents will begin receiving 35% renewable content and low costs through AVCE's Core Choice program. You also have the option of moving up to More Choice, with 50% renewable content. The Your Choice program allows those generating renewable power on site to continue in a program similar to SCE's net zero metering. Because the choice is in your hands, if you prefer to stay with SCE, you can opt out of AVCE programs entirely.
