Where were you in 1998?! The last episode of The Seinfeld Show aired. The second Harry Potter book was published. And the first Freedom Festival was held in Apple Valley! The whole event was contained to the front parking lot of Brewster Park, and 2,500 people came to play homespun carnival games like "Frozen Chicken Bowling." The Apple Valley Soccer Club served up cotton candy and pizza, and the Town of Apple Valley and Apple Valley Fire District went head to head in softball.

Nowadays, more than 10,000 people enter the gates, and thousands more watch from across the valley. You can browse five acres of vendors, choose from 25 food booths, and relive a lifetime of memories as you listen to music and connect with family and friends, as fireworks burst overhead.

Join us as we celebrate the 20th anniversary of this event on Tuesday, July 4. Live entertainment starts at 2 p.m. with Bad Water Junction, a local classic rock and country band. Patriotic entertainment with A Penny A Kiss will begin at 5 p.m. followed by "A Diamond is Forever," a 7-piece Neil Diamond tribute band. Lead singer, David J. Sherry, will make you "Feel the Neil!"

A new fun zone will offer a bungee trampoline, aqua bubble ride, a giant slide and an obstacle course. Attraction prices range from \$7 to \$10 per ride. The day will also include free games, crafts and activities which

culminate at 9 p.m. with the largest fireworks show in the High Desert. Tune in to Kat Country 100.7 for patriotic music simulcast to the fireworks show. Start early at the Firecracker 5/10K - see page 2 for details.


The popular beer garden will complement a variety of food booths featuring your favorite festival fare.

Lenny Brewster Sports Center is located at 21024 Otoe Road. Take Dale Evans Parkway 1.5 miles north from Highway 18. Bring your canopies and chairs, but please, no alcohol, pets or barbecues will be allowed in the park, and all Town parks are 100% smoke and vape-free.

Due to construction of the water recycling plant on the south side of the park, and restrictions against parking on some private property in the area, everyone must enter the park on foot through the entrance on Otoe Road. Handicap parking will be available immediately outside the main entrance.

Please pay attention to signage and follow instructions from the deputies and Explorer Scouts managing the parking area. For the safety of attendees, some light towers are placed in the approved parking areas surrounding the park. If you plan to watch the fireworks from your car, please note that these remain on during the fireworks show so you may want to watch for them as you choose your location.

PASSPORTS

Processed at Town Hall

Going on vacation? Make your first stop Apple Valley Town Hall. The Town Clerk's office has processed thousands of passports since it began offering the service in 2003, earning an award for Performance Excellence by the Department of State for its outstanding service as a Passport Acceptance Facility.

Normal passport office hours are Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to noon; and on afternoons and Fridays by appointment only at (760) 240-7000 x7800. The office also offers appointments until 7 p.m. the third Thursday of each month.

Standard passports for adults are \$110 plus a separate \$25 processing fee. Passports for children age 15 and under are \$80 plus a separate \$25 processing fee. Wallet-sized U.S. Passport Cards are valid for land and sea crossings between the U.S. and Canada, Mexico, Bermuda and the Caribbean. Fees including the Town processing fee are \$55 for adults and \$40 for children 15 years and younger. Application fees and processing fees must be paid separately.

Passports can be expedited within two to three weeks for \$60 per application. Emergency passport information can be obtained by contacting the United States Department of State Los Angeles Passport Agency at (877) 487-2778 or visit www.travel.state.gov.

REHABILITATION

Repairs Roof, Makes Home Comfortable

When Apple Valley resident Raetricia Luizzi bought her home, the roof had two major leaks. Repeated patch jobs became costly and ineffective. With the help of the Town's housing department, she was able to replace her entire roof and bring a few smaller items up to code with a 0% interest deferred loan from the Residential Rehabilitation Loan Program.

"It surprised me that it went so fast. They started the teardown on Tuesday morning and they were done by Friday," Raetricia said. "The housing department at the Town is awesome. Everything about the process was explained clearly and everything went according to schedule. After we finalized the paperwork, the work just began."

Owners are eligible for improvements to their home that include health, safety and code issues, energy conservation, accessibility improvements for disabled, and necessary repairs for deferred maintenance.

"I'm still surprised at how fast and smooth the process went. I kept thinking there would be some kind of problem, but there wasn't," said Raetricia. "My home is absolutely beautiful with the new roof and the new insulation makes it much more comfortable."



REVERSE TRIATHLON

To Challenge Athletes

More than 500 athletes will run, bike and swim their way through the Town of Apple Valley's 8th Annual Reverse Triathlon on Saturday, September 24 at Civic Center Park, behind Town Hall. The day will feature three events: a triathlon, a 5k run, and a kid's triathlon for those 11 years and younger.

The Reverse Triathlon will start with a 5k run, transition into a 12-mile flat road course, and finish with a 150-yard pool swim. The Apple Valley kids triathlon will consist of a .75-mile run, 1-mile bike ride, and a 50-yard swim. The event will also include a standalone 5K.

Thanks to the support of Walmart, all athletes will receive a T-shirt and medal. Plaques will be awarded to the top three triathlon competitors in each age group. Medals will be awarded to the top three overall male and female participants for the 5k event. Each kid tri-athlete will receive a medal and

T-shirt but no additional ranked awards will be given as this event is purely for the enjoyment of the kids.

To ensure everyone's safety, the Town and the Police Department will close Dale Evans Parkway from Bass Hill Road to Corwin Road from 6:30 a.m. to approximately 9:30 a.m. Waalew will also be closed from Corwin to Navajo. Drivers can access Highway 18 via Rancherias or Corwin to the west and Navajo or Flathead to the east.

Citizens on Patrol (COPs) will provide traffic assistance to residents of Dale Evans Parkway and areas just north of Brewster Park who need to reach a detour point. For the safety of the athletes please do not drive on Dale Evans without a COP escort.

Look How Far We've Come!

Take a walk down the aisle of the holding pens at the Town of Apple Valley's municipal animal shelter and you will be greeted by a cacophony of barks and howls. Dogs of every shape and size clamor for attention in hopes that they will soon be adopted into permanent, loving homes. Just around the corner, the cat colonies are overflowing with felines. Some of them are strays. Some of them are owner turn-ins. Some of them were just in the wrong place at the wrong time....and all of them just want love and attention.

Since March of 2005, the Town of Apple Valley has provided a safe, temporary space for our Town's furry residents. The first facility was a converted residential home and warehouse with an annual capacity for 3,425 animals. Three short years later it housed nearly 5,000 animals per year and was showing significant wear and tear. Recognizing that the desired level of service had outgrown the capacity of the temporary animal shelter, the Town Council approved the design and con-

struction of a purpose-built municipal animal shelter that was completed in 2010.

The new facility raised the bar for municipal animal sheltering. It was constructed with special consideration for increasing animal holding-times, isolating sick animals from the general population, separating species to reduce stress, room for public education classes & low-cost vaccination clinics, increasing volunteer opportunities and providing space for animal evacuees during emergencies.

Most of the programs and discounted services we offer are thanks to generous donors who support AVAS signature events and provide funding for special offers, such as the Furball Fundraising Dinner, Cruisin' Fur Critters, Night at the Shelter, Pets & Patriots Month, Pet Adoption Extravaganza, Jr. Pet Keeper Camp, Low-cost Vaccination Clinics & Microchipping, and numerous other adoption events.

Our biggest event of the year is coming up on October 21. Join us for the Paws N' Claws Pet Fair at Civic Center Park from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. where we will celebrate all things furry, feathered and scaly. Bring the family and your pets for low-cost vaccines, micro-chip services, training, demonstrations, retail vendors and, of course, the opportunity to adopt a new pet into the family. Watch our website or Facebook page for more information as the event draws near.

Apple Valley's Municipal Animal Shelter is open Tuesday through Saturday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at 22131 Powhatan Road at Quinnault Road, providing consistent access to our shelter, including one day during the weekend. FIRE DEPARTMENT

Encourages Defensible Space

It's that time of the year when we need to take a look around our property and make sure we are as fire safe as possible. With the heavy rains, followed by heavy growth, we must be especially diligent as fire season approaches.

Defensible space is the required distance between a structure (home, detached garage, out buildings, etc.) and the wildland area. This space creates a buffer to slow or halt the spread of a wildland fire to a structure. Defensible space protects the structure from igniting due to direct flame or radiant heat. It is essential for structure survivability during wildland fire conditions and equally important for the protection of firefighters defending your home/property.

Use this check list to determine your defensible space.

- Trim your trees to keep branches a minimum of 10' from structures.
- Remove dry leaves and pine needles from your yard, roof, and rain gutters.
- Keep wood piles at least 35' away from structures.
- Mow dry grasses down to a maximum height of 4 inches.

If a fire does occur be ready with your Emergency Action Plan to evacuate when you are asked to by the fire department or law enforcement.

S.H.O.C.K. & AWE

Apple Valley Deputy Derrick Griego doesn't really believe there are bad kids...only kids who make bad choices. Whether it is their family background, the crowd they hang out with at school, the neighborhood they live in or simply teenage angst, these bad decisions can be replaced with some S.H.O.C.K. - Self-discipline, Honor, Obedience, Character and Knowledge.

These are the traits that Deputy Griego and the Apple Valley Police Activities League aim to instill in the youth that participate in a 10week program to combat the negative influences facing today's teens.

"It isn't just for the 'bad kids' like people think it is," Griego explained. "This program changes lives. The transformations we see are aweinspiring."

Classes are held three nights a week and include 90 minutes of physical activity and 90 minutes of classroom instruction. Topics of focus run the gamut from nutrition and fitness to interpersonal communication. They combat influences like drugs, gangs, teen pregnancy, communication issues and teach self respect. Other sessions focus on improving job skills, improving life standards, and examining the participants' core values.

Concurrently, parents and guardians are required to attend the "Parent Project" portion of the program that equips them with tools for effective parenting.

Grand Opening

Decades of planning and more than three years of construction became a reality when we cut the ribbon on the Yucca Loma Bridge in May. The ceremony saw 300 people welcome the first official procession across the bridge. Students from Rio Vista School of Applied Learning sang the National Anthem and led the parade of council members and dignitaries. The next day, we welcomed 1000 community members to the "Walk 'n Roll Bridge Bash" for a 1- and 2.5-mile walk/bike/skate and scooter trek across the bridge and back. Guests were treated to free t-shirts, hot dogs and shave ice.

The bridge appeared on traffic plans as early as the 1960s, and was identified as the Town's number one transportation priority in 2006. The ground breaking was in January 2014. Measuring 1,606 feet, it includes two lanes in each direction, barrier-protected pedestrian and bike paths, and Class II bike lanes on each side. Large steel apples greet drivers at each end. The art was created by Tony Oliver, of Oliver's Designs of Hesperia.

The City of Victorville is planning the third phase of the project that will extend Yates Road over the BNSF Railroad to Green Tree Boulevard at Hesperia Road.
