

#### **TOWN COUNCIL AWARDS \$84,000 TO LOCAL NONPROFITS**

Jimmy Waldron knows what it is like to be homeless and hungry. As recently as 10 years ago, he slept at a local truck stop without a roof of his own. Today, Waldron is the Executive Director of High Desert Homeless Services in Victorville, where he can relate to the hundreds of clients the facility serves each week for hot showers, employment services, clothing and more.

"They don't want to be homeless. They want to get back on their feet," said Waldron, who dispelled the myth that everyone who ends up homeless has a mental illness or a drug addiction. "They are good people, good families who may just be here due to a loss of income. They use our resource room to find jobs, a place to live, get training and more."

Former Apple Valley resident Nicole Cerda is living proof of the program's success. This summer, she found herself in a housing arrangement she couldn't live with anymore, so she turned to the shelter for help.

"It was a life-changing event. The staff is so friendly and welcomed me with open arms," she said. In her few short weeks there she has found two concurrent jobs and is on track for finding an apartment back in Apple Valley soon.

High Desert Homeless Services is one of several local agencies that received funds from the Town of Apple Valley's Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) this year.

Town of Apple Valley, California

Each year, Apple Valley receives funding from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The purpose is to provide decent, affordable housing, a suitable living environment and economic opportunities for people with low to moderate incomes.

While most of the federal funds are used for residential rehabilitation loans and other capital improvements, including parks and streets, HUD allows municipalities to distribute a maximum of 15% towards grants for local social services, which the Town Council does each year.

"The process to select these nonprofits is highly competitive. Thanks to evaluation by our Community Development Citizen's Advisory Committee, and feedback at public hearings, the Town Council is able to designate funds that will help hundreds of Apple Valley residents improve their quality of life," said Orlando Acevedo, Assistant Director of Economic Development and Housing.



# **CONTRACTORS NEEDED**

### for Residential Repairs

If you are a qualified general contractor with experience in repairing residential structures, your skills are needed in the Residential Rehabilitation Loan Program (RRLP). The RRLP provides eligible Apple Valley residents with 0% interest, deferred loans (no monthly payments) to repair single-family, owner-occupied homes. Eligible improvements include addressing code violations, painting, roofing, plumbing, heating, cooling, damaged ceilings and walls, as well as other health and safety items. The program can also be used for energy conservation and accessibility improvements.

# BIG LOTS

### A Big Deal for Apple Valley

The Town of Apple Valley will soon be home to one of only five Big Lots distribution centers in North America. The 1.3 million-square-foot facility is planned for construction just south of the Walmart Distribution Center on Johnson Road.

The project will bring 400-500 new jobs to Apple Valley and the surrounding region. The \$120 million investment by Big Lots, including streets, infrastructure improvements, and increased property taxes, will be a major shot in the arm for the entire High Desert economy.

The Big Lots center falls inside the 6,600-acre North Apple Valley Industrial Specific Plan (NAVISP) and joins current tenants such as Fresenius Medical Care's Tru Blu Logistics Center, the Walmart Distribution Center and Victor Valley College's Regional Public Safety Training Center.

#### **Other Economic Development News**

With the completion of the Yucca Loma Bridge, the Quail Ridge Plaza at the northeast corner of Apple Valley and Yucca Loma roads is now in the early planning stages. Mal Riley, developer of the 2nd and 3rd phases of Jess Ranch Marketplace, is inviting interest in the mixed-use concept, including restaurants, offices, town homes or multi-family and senior living. Also, after years of litigation, Walmart is ready to pursue development of the southeast corner of Thunderbird and Dale Evans. We will be talking more with them soon on the next steps towards their project.

Posting the Big Lots news on Facebook, a citizen asked, "Why doesn't the Town repurpose vacant buildings in the area?"

Answer: Our Economic Development Department actively engages with property owners to attract tenants, as well as assists new and expanding businesses in finding a location that best meets their needs. Sometimes those efforts result in a match with an existing building, and other times it results in new construction. Square footage, zoning and available infrastructure are just a few of the factors that come in to play. Ultimately, it is the decision of the business owner, as long as they meet Development Code requirements.

## TIRE AMNESTY PROGRAM

**Grant insures 2 more years of Tire Amnesty Days** 

The Tire Amnesty program in Apple Valley has racked up some impressive numbers, with an estimated 150,000 tires diverted from landfills since the program inception! Just since 2009, 30 tire amnesty days have helped 45,000 tires find new life as "tire-derived fuel" for the Mitsubishi Cement Corporation in Lucerne Valley.

The successful program will continue as the Town just received a \$35,000 grant from CalRecycle. This will fund 12 tire amnesty events over the next two years.

Free tire disposal events help lessen the environmental impacts of illegally dumped tires, including fire hazard, mosquito breeding grounds, and surface and groundwater pollution.








### **VVTA Launches**

## **NEW APPLE VALLEY ROUTE**



Need to get to points north? The new Victor Valley Transit Authority (VVTA) Route 42 now offers daily bus service between north Apple Valley and Victorville.

The route connects WTA's major transfer

point at Victor Valley College (WC) to previously unserved key locations throughout northern Apple Valley. These include the WC Regional Public Safety Training Center, which trains future firefighters, police officers, paramedics and emergency medical technicians. It also has stops at the High Desert Juvenile Detention Center and the Walmart Distribution Center with 1000 employees. It will also have a positive impact on the 400 households at Los Ranchos Mobile Home Park, where families, students and senior citizens had few public transportation options previously.

Single-trip fixed route fare is \$1.25. Student discount fare is \$1. Single-trip discount fare is 60 cents for veterans, seniors 60 and over, and those with disabilities or on Medicare. Students age 14 and over and all discount fares require photo identification.

VVTA's service area spans nearly 1,000 square miles, featuring service to Adelanto, Apple Valley, Barstow, Hesperia, Needles, Victorville and unincorporated San Bernardino County, from Wrightwood to Yermo. Commuter service to Fort Irwin National Training Center (NTC) and connecting service from the High Desert to the Inland Empire is also provided. # **VVTA WATCH**

### **New Safety App Empowers Riders**

Identifying a trend for heightened passenger safety and transit security, VVTA recently launched VVTA Watch, an app for immediately reporting safety or security concerns, using a mobile phone or tablet.

The app enables passenger reporting via the app or text messaging, providing immediate notice to the transit agency. WTA Watch is available for Android and Apple devices.

Through the app, passengers may directly call 911, or discretely call police or submit a report and include a photo or video. The app even disables the camera flash to not draw attention. The GPS location of the passenger Is automatically tagged and, once a report is initiated, two-way communication between the passenger and WTA is established. Passengers may also submit a report by text to (760) 201-1440.

Disruptive behavior, crime in progress, security or safety issue, as well as immediately threatening situations such as an assault or fighting among passengers or with the bus operator are some of the situations passengers may report.

In addition to receiving messages from passengers, WTA can use the communication system to broadcast service alerts and BOLO (Be On the Look Out) alerts to passengers and staff. Missing persons, dementia patients and criminal suspects can be more quickly located by asking passengers to help.



Are you ready to help yourself, your family and even your neighborhood in times of emergency? Get prepared by participating in a free 20-hour Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Class.

The CERT Program educates citizens on disaster preparedness and hazards, and trains them in basic disaster response skills such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, disaster medical operations and terrorism. Through classroom training and exercises, CERT members are able to assist others in their neighborhood or workplace. CERT members are also encouraged to support emergency response agencies by taking a more active role in emergency preparedness projects in their community. Additional training is available to become a Disaster Services Worker, which allows for service such as being a member of the Fire Fighter Rehab Team, as shown in the photo.

Each year, the Town of Apple Valley is an active participant in the state-wide Great ShakeOut Drill, this year on October 19 at 10:19 a.m. Our Disaster Services Workers (DSW), which includes Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) and Emergency Communications Services (ECS), will be participating as well.

The drill will include CERT members performing a search and rescue in Town Hall buildings. The ECS team will handle communications. A new addition this year is a medical triage exercise for victims.

This is a great learning experience for both the Town staff, response teams and any customers in our buildings during the drill. So if you are at Town Hall or the DSB building on October 19 at 10:19 a.m. don't be surprised if you see our staff following the ShakeOut instructions to "Drop, Cover, and Hold On!"

# FIRE DISTRICT

### **Opens Two More Stations**

AVFPD was formed in 1951. It is a separate government entity from the Town of Apple Valley, and not a direct service provided by the Town.

With the passage of Measure A last November, voters secured the future of the Fire District with the funding needed to maintain services as well as re-open two previously closed fire stations.

The Fire District has recruited, tested and hired new personnel to staff these stations. Fourteen experienced firefighter/paramedics, engineers, and captains completed the Fire District's two-week mini academy in July, where they trained in hose and ladder evolutions, ventilation training, forcible entry, vehicle extrication, wild land hose lays, and concluded with a structural training burn.

Two previously closed fire stations re-opened on July 23 to serve the Apple Valley community, allowing for decreased response times and the ability to continue to have units available for other calls for service.

The new employees, along with twelve promoted employeess, received their badges and helmets at a special ceremony on July 28. John F. Kennedy is quoted as saying, "As we express our gratitude, we must never forget that the highest appreciation is not to utter words, but to live by them." This quote embodies the promise the Fire District made during the Measure A campaign, which was to re-open stations, reduce response times, and better serve our community.
