Presidio Arts Festival returns to Apple Valley

After a three-year absence, the Presidio Arts Festival is returning to Apple Valley on June 4 - 6. Last held in 2000, the Presidio Arts Festival had grown steadily in prestige and attendance over its 11 year run.

The show, sponsored by Overall Impressions Fine Art Gallery, will be held at the Presidio Recreation Center, located in the heart of the master-planned golf course community of Jess Ranch. With lakes, lush landscaping and an adjacent golf course, the shady colonnades and ample parking of the Presidio provide a perfect festival setting. Pulte/Del Webb has graciously offered the use of the facility free of charge. Under the auspices of the Apple Valley Community Resource Foundation, a non-profit fundraising arm of the Town, all money from this event will support future cultural endeavors in Apple Valley.

Artists working in oils, acrylics, watercolor, pastels, photography, clay, jewelry and other fine art media are invited to inquire about available space. Space fees are \$75. The artist must be present during the show - no dealers are allowed.

"Bee" cautious during summer months

As the days grow warmer and desert flowers bloom, High Desert wildlife tends to come out of hiding. One common resident in our area is the honeybee.



Due to fears regarding "killer bees" or the Africanized honeybee, residents are calling authorities whenever they find a hive or swarming (flying) in their yards. However, unless someone is actually attacked by the swarm, the Fire Department is not the agency to call. The Animal Control Department can refer you

to a local beekeeper or, if the bees are nesting in your home or a structure on your property, you will be directed to call a local pest control company or exterminator.

Since African honeybees have been found in the desert area it is important to be on the lookout for bees around your home and yard, as well as in barns and pens where animal are confined. According to a Texas A&M University Agricultural newsletter, Africanized bees will nest almost anywhere around your home, even inside a meter box or in a rain spout. When working or playing outdoors always look and listen for bees, and never let children play in an area until you have checked. Don't step on or turn over logs or rocks where bees may be nesting.

While caution is justified, their reputation as "killers" is exaggerated. African bees are mostly a danger to people or residents who provoke them and/or are unable to get away. Like most animals, these bees react defensively only when they feel threatened. The African bee is a new insect nuisance, but a controllable one.

Should you be stung, it is important to remember the following:

→ Everybody reacts in some way to stings, such as swelling around the sting area.

⇒ Less then 1 percent of the population has a systemic

Wanted: Residents with "The Right Stuff"

Apple Valley residents have won a total of \$300 this year with "The Right Stuff" contest. Entries drawn in January, February and March all won \$100 each. Unfortunately, April's entry did not have both trash and recycling containers out at the street for pickup, so they could not win.

What's that? You haven't heard about the contest? Where have you been?? Each month one address is drawn from contest entry forms. The contents of the trash and recycling containers from that residence are evaluated by AVCO personnel. If each container contains "the right stuff," the allergy to bee stings, which may include swelling of the tongue or throat, hives, dizziness or difficulty with breathing, or loss of consciousness, usually within 20 minutes of the sting.

→ For a normal, healthy person to receive a deadly dose of bee venom, it would take about 10 stings for each pound of body weight, or 1,500 stings at once for a 150-pound person. A honeybee (including the Africanized variety) only stings once, and then dies.

► Honeybees are attracted to hair and dark colors.

→ Regular honeybees will chase you about half the length of a football field (150 feet). Africanized honeybees may pursue you three times that far, or more.

⇒ If you are stung and are not allergic, remove the stinger quickly by scraping with a fingernail, knife blade, credit card or similar material. Ice packs and sting-kill ointments can relieve swelling and pain.
