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It is easier than ever to report a public safety issue in Apple Valley now that the Town has released a cloud-based reporting app for mobile phones.


Apple Valley Watch is a security app that allows residents to notify police of non-emergency safety and security concerns in the Town of Apple Valley straight from their cell phone. The free app enables users to anonymously submit reports with photos or videos without a flash or sound to dispatchers who can respond to or address problems. Additionally, in the case of an emergency, a direct to 9-1-1 button is available.

The non-emergency reports will be monitored by law enforcement and town staff during normal business hours. Users can report matters easily from any mobile device to document occurrences such as aggressive animals, Illegal drug activity, gang-related activity, graffiti, vandalism, traffic concerns and more.

The app was developed by the ELERTS Corp, a provider of See Something Say Something mobile apps for public and transit agencies. It is available for iPhones in the Apple Store and Android phones in Google Play. Search Apple Valley Watch to download.

PRACTICE YOUR ABCS

FOR WATER SAFETY

Warmer weather means more time in and around the water. Startling statistics show that drowning is the nation's number one killer of children under the age of 5 and it's the second leading cause of death for ages 1 to 14. By following these safety precautions year-round, you can help prevent your family from becoming a statistic.

A. Adult Supervision

NEVER leave a child alone by or in the water, even for a second. Always maintain eye-to-eye supervision. Inflatable flotation devices should never be substituted for adult supervision. Know your location address and phone number in the event 9-1-1 is called.

B. Barriers

Install a pool isolation fence and make sure all gates are self-closing and self-latching, and move any chairs or tables away from the fence so children cannot climb up for access to the pool. Keep all doors and windows leading to the pool area locked or install alarm devices to alert you if someone enters the pool area.

C. Classes

- Learn CPR through the Fire Department
- Enroll children in swim classes
- Have children attend a "Stewie the Duck" water safety program

Can Remedy Sewer Issues

The Town's housing stock has grown tremendously since our incorporation in 1988. As some of our older residences age they may need repairs on items such as septic systems and roofs.

The Town of Apple Valley Housing and Community Development Division offers financial assistance for many of these repairs in the form of a 30-year deferred, 0% interest Residential Rehabilitation Loan Program (RRLP). Residents within Apple Valley town limits are encouraged to apply for the program that offers up to \$25,000 for repairs including, but not limited to, septic replacement or mandatory sewer connection.

All work must be for single-family owner-occupied homes. Loans are subject to terms and conditions, and are offered to qualified low to moderate income homeowners. Recipients must execute a loan contract and provide information for loan underwriting.

NEW MULCH

Increases Safety at Town Playgrounds



Five playgrounds in the Town's park system have received mulch makeovers thanks to a grant from Cal Recycle and the elbow grease of Public Works Department employees.

Over the course of the last few months,

crews have replaced the old wood chips with a rubber mulch made of recycled automotive tires. The new material provides better shock absorption for children in fall areas and will last much longer than the engineered wood fiber previously used.

"At first the wood chips work fine, but after time they break down," said Public Works Supervisor Mike Molinari. "They break, splinter and practically turn to dust, which creates a number of problems."

Molinari explained that the \$140,520 grant funded the purchase of 483,600 pounds of "tire derived product" that was divided among Thunderbird, Norm Schmidt, Mendel, Corwin and Civic Center parks. This is the equivalent of 40,300 passenger tires that were diverted from California landfills.

"Our Code Enforcement Department takes in hundreds of tires a year during their Tire Amnesty Day events to keep them from being discarded in the desert where they become an eyesore and a breeding ground for mosquitoes," said Director of Public Works Greg Snyder. "Seeing something that can be a public nuisance transformed into a benefit for the families in our community is very satisfying."

The Town of Apple Valley maintains 12 public parks and a public golf course for the enjoyment of residents and our neighbors in the Victor Valley.

Protect Your Mail From TIIFT


Law enforcement and postal inspectors across the country work hard to protect your mail. With deliveries to millions of addresses every day, authorities can't do the job alone.

Here's what you can do to protect your mail from thieves:

- Use the letter slots inside your Post Office for your mail, or hand it to a letter carrier.
- Pick up your mail promptly. Don't leave it in your mailbox overnight.
- If you're expecting checks, credit cards, or valuable items, ask a trusted friend or neighbor to pick up your mail.
- If you don't receive mail you are expecting, contact the issuing agency immediately.
- Immediately notify your Post Office if you change your address.
- Don't send cash in the mail.
- Place a hold on your mail at the Post Office when you go out of town.
- Exchange work and vacation schedules with trusted friends and neighbors, to coordinate mail pick-ups.
- Consult with your local Postmaster for the most up-to-date regulations on mailboxes, including the availability of locked centralized or curbside mailboxes.

WATER SAFETY ASSEMBLIES

Help Save Lives

Each spring the Fire District partners with the Apple Valley Unified School District to present the "Stewie the Duck Learns to Swim" water safety program.

Fatal drowning remains the second-leading cause of unintentional injuryrelated death for children ages 1 to 14. Drowning is the leading cause of death for infants and young children in 18 states. Drowning is known as a "silent death" because children literally drown without a sound. According to the Safe Kids Coalition, what makes this even more frightening is that 58% of parents do not consider drowning a threat to their children.

This program aims to change these statistics. The "Stewie the Duck Learns to Swim" program is designed for children in kindergarten and first grade and is presented in a 20-minute assembly by the Fire District.
