

Sponsors and gyms in Apple Valley are encouraged to join the Town in helping participants find their success this year.


A Facebook group will keep members on track for



VISTA DEL SOL COMMUNITY

Tapped for Future Growth

Ten years after the recession that would collapse the nation's housing industry, Apple Valley's Vista Del Sol Community has been granted a development permit to complete the 96 remaining single-family tract homes in north Apple Valley. With 30 homes built and occupied in the gated community, the project aims to bring an additional level of home customization to prospective buyers seeking Apple Valley's rural lifestyle, dramatic landscapes and growing community.

"We are seeing some excitement from the housing market and are hopeful to meet that market demand here in the High Desert for the semi-custom home product," said homebuilder Dave Faylor of Evergreen Homes. "We are optimistic heading into 2019."

Located in north Apple Valley along Choco Road, the Vista Del Sol Community's last home was built in 2008. The latest proposal, approved by the Apple Valley Planning Commission in December, consists of four floor plans ranging from 2,508 to 3,396-square-feet of living area with three different building elevations per floor plan. Construction is expected to commence in early 2019.

"Apple Valley's high quality of life makes it a great place to live," said Town Manager Doug Robertson. "In fact, we've been voted best place to live seven years running. This project is another example that Apple Valley is still on the map as a prime location for housing growth. The continuation of this project will bring more options to people considering moving to Apple Valley."

FIRE DISTRICT

PLAYS A ROLE IN DISTRIBUTION CENTER SAFETY

Slated to open in late 2019, the Big Lots Distribution Center is the newest addition to the North Apple Valley industrial area.

At 1.3 million square feet it is the largest concrete tilt-up construction in Apple Valley and the local Fire District is playing a role in its safety measures.

Fire Suppression Facts:

- For a building this size there are 37 separate sprinkler systems
- It contains 17 individual sprinkler risers
- It has more than 500 Early Suppression Fast Response (ESFR) Sprinkler heads. These types of sprinklers are designed to distribute a large amount of water rapidly to quickly suppress a fire.

To put these facts into perspective, a 5,000-square-foot commercial building would be equipped with one sprinkler system consisting of one sprinkler riser and approximately 20 standard sprinkler heads.

2019 RUNNING SERIES

Begins This April

The Recreation Department will launch its 2019 running series this spring with the Bunny Run on April 20, followed by the Firecracker Run on July 4, and the Turkey Run on November 23.

"Our runs have gained a pretty big following with more and more participants signing up each year," said Recreation Supervisor Andy Shoup.
"Each race takes place at a different park in Apple Valley so our competitors get a new route and the chance to see different parts of Town at every event."

STREET PAVING PROJECTS Continue in 2019

Since our incorporation 30 years ago, one of the Town's top priorities has been to develop and maintain a strong transportation system. For that reason, the Town has made resurfacing the roughly 420 miles of paved roads a primary focus.

Since August of 2017, the Town has collectively paved approximately 100 miles of residential, collector, and arterial roadways using multiple funding sources such as Senate Bill 1 (SB1) and Local Transportation Funds (LTF).

The town's engineering department is preparing to resurface an additional 15 miles of bus routes using LTF funds. This work should begin in April and last approximately two months.

"Using LTF funds to improve the heavily traveled bus routes allows us to use our normal paving budget on residential areas and collector roads that may be overlooked while focusing on the major roads that require constant attention," said Town Manager Doug Robertson, who noted that a new residential surfacing project has been slated to begin this summer.

Prioritizing roadwork is a balance between reconstructing severely deteriorated roads and maintaining less damaged roads to prevent the need for more costly upgrades. Sometimes, there are roads that simply need a pothole patch but are otherwise in good condition.

BUS STOP

Improves Accessibility

Bus riders traveling west on Bear Valley Road now have easier access to the Victor Valley Transit Authority (VVTA) bus stop between Kiowa and Snapping Turtle roads thanks to the recently completed Bear Valley Road Bus Stop Improvement Project that was completed with \$269,287 in Local Transportation Funds (LTF).

The new bus turnout and ADA compliant shelter replaced an outdated structure that formerly stood on a dirt shoulder. Additionally, the sidewalk gap between Outer Bear Valley and Snapping Turtle was closed with the construction of a new, 10-footwide sidewalk and ADA accessible curb ramps.

"The focus of this project was accessibility and making it easier for our residents to get around town either by bus, bike, or on foot," said Town Engineer Brad Miller. "It was important for us to remove the dirt barrier that served as an obstruction, particularly for people in wheelchairs and walkers."

Now that the project, is complete, residents at the Solstice Senior Living facility and adjacent areas can travel along a sidewalk to the shopping centers at the intersection of Bear Valley and Kiowa Roads.

The bus stop was identified by Town and WTA staff as having the heaviest usage without the benefit of a paved stop. Town staff will continue to work closely with the WTA to identify similar areas where LTF dollars can be used to improve accessibility.

Continue to Save Lives

German shepherds, boa constrictor snakes, roosters, fresh water turtles and even a pot belly pig named 'Hamlet' have all been featured 'stars' of the Apple Valley Animal Shelter's Pet Match video series. The show is aimed at increasing the adoption rates for all animals that enter the shelter by introducing them on video through the shelter's Facebook page (@Apple Valley Animal Shelter) and Apple Valley's PEG television channels (Charter channel 186, Verizon/Frontier channel 29). In fact, adoption rates have increased by more than 30 percent for each animal featured on the show.

"Our efforts along with those sharing and tuning in every week have helped place more than 120 pets in 2018 alone. I am quite honored to be a part of the AVAS Pet Match team and look forward to our 2019 series."



FREE DISASTER RESPONSE TRAINING

Are you ready to help yourself, your family and even your neighborhood in times of emergency? Get prepared by participating in a free 20-hour Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Basic Training Class.

The CERT Program educates citizens on disaster preparedness and hazards, and trains them in basic disaster response skills such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, disaster medical operations and terrorism. Through classroom training and exercises, CERT members are able to assist others in their neighborhood or workplace. CERT members are also encouraged to support emergency response agencies by taking a more active role in emergency preparedness projects in their community.

Additional training is available to become a Volunteer Disaster Services Worker, which allows for our community members to be activated in support of our first responders in a major disaster.

LIFEGUARD TRAINING CLASS

OFFERED THIS SPRING

Every summer the Town of Apple Valley hires a crew of lifeguards to supervise swimmers, teach lessons and more. Become eligible for one of these valuable positions this spring at one of two Lifeguard Training sessions. The knowledge and skills taught in this course will teach participants everything they need to keep themselves and others safe in and around any aquatic environment.

The course covers rescue skills, CPR/AED, first aid, emergency childbirth and major trauma emergencies.

Successful completion of Lifeguard Training is required for all who seek employment as a lifeguard at the Civic Center Park Aquatic Center. Refunds will be given for participants who fail to pass the pre-swim requirement test.

Apple Valley Expands

HOME IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

For Low-Income Residents

Rain, high winds and freezing temperatures can have negative effects on housing structures in the High Desert. Homeowners wrestling with damage from the winter season may qualify for the Town of Apple Valley's Residential Rehabilitation Loan Program to make repairs, replace old appliances, or furnish new improvements to their existing home.

The rehabilitation program has been expanded to include owneroccupied multi-family housing, up to four units. The owner must reside in one of the units and all tenants must meet proper income requirements under the terms and conditions of the federallyfunded program.

The program offers a 0% interest loan up to \$25,000 for eligible participants that can be used to increase energy conservation, replace or modify any health, safety or code violations and make improvements for disabled accessibility or other necessary repairs for deferred maintenance. For example, a family of four with a clear title and a maximum income of \$53,900 annually could qualify for a 0% simple interest loan deferred for 30 years.

Apple Valley's Residential Rehabilitation Loan Program is an Equal Housing Opportunity Program.

Virulent Newcastle Disease



Residents raising fowl in Apple Valley are encouraged to be on the alert for symptoms your flock has been exposed to the Virulent Newcastle Disease (VND) that has been found in Southern California. It is a contagious disease of birds, including chickens. All birds can be infected with VND. In most cases the disease will kill chickens. Other birds may not get sick

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DOUG ROBERTSON

Reflects on First Year as Town Manager

It's hard to believe it's been a year already, yet at times it's hard to believe it's only been a year. This has been one of the most eventful, challenging, yet rewarding experiences in my career and I am thrilled to have the privilege to serve as your Town Manager.

We've had to dig deep to continue to provide essential public services without noticeable interruption. Significant budget cuts, including the closure of one park and staff downsizing, have not been easy, but they have been an important step in bringing our expenditures back in line with our revenues. These actions will ensure we have the fiscal wherewithal to keep moving forward on one of the most important issues in the Town's thirty years of incorporation: transitioning the Town's water supply into an asset owned and managed by you, the residents of Apple Valley.

In 2018, the court ruled in favor of the Town, and against Liberty Utilities, stating that the Town had followed state environmental laws and could continue our acquisition efforts. We expect more progress in 2019, including a trial where a judge will consider the Town's right-to-take the water system.

In 2019, the Big Lots Distribution Center will open, adding several hundred industrial jobs to our community and the greater High Desert. Tractor Supply Company will open, adding to our growing retail base. The Town will also annex more than 1,300 acres into the Town's boundaries in north Apple Valley including prime freeway frontage along I-15. These extraordinary actions lay the groundwork for long-term economic growth and stability in Apple Valley's commercial and industrial sectors.

After recently meeting with several developers and real estate professionals, my 2019 work plan includes engaging with the Town Council and Planning Commission to propose changes to the Development Code that will give us greater flexibility to help bring more business to Apple Valley. Our goals are to make Apple Valley truly business friendly while maintaining our high-quality standards and "Better Way of Life."

Hand in hand with that will be a renewed focus on fostering quality customer service to our residents, businesses and developers as we begin several important projects that will continue to show that Apple Valley is the place to live, work and play.
