PBetter Way of

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BIKE PATH UPGRADES Make It Easier To Share The Road

As the weather warms up, the number of bicycles on Apple Valley roads

will increase. The Town of Apple Valley advocates this clean, green choice of transportation and recreation, and continues to upgrade and expand the bicycle network whenever possible.

The upgrades align with the "Three Feet for Safety Act" requiring motorists to maintain a minimum of three feet of clearance when passing bicyclists.


In the fall of 2017, the Town added additional miles of Class II Bikeway to enhance bicycle safety

throughout Apple Valley. Class II Bikeways are one-way striped segments along paved roadways for use by cyclists.

The Town widened the right turn lanes at four signalized intersections on Apple Valley Road to accommodate bicycle traffic. In addition, the repainted striping increased visibility for motorists, and new signs were posted throughout the town identifying bicycle lanes.

Later in 2019, bike paths will be added to the frontage of the Mariana Academy and Sandia Academy increasing opportunities for kids to bike to school.

There are few better ways to show your pet you love them than to keep them current on their vaccines. Apple Valley Animal Services will offer lowcost vaccines on May 15, June 5, Aug. 7 and Dec. 4 at the shelter from 5 to 7 p.m.

Rabies vaccines are available for dogs or cats for \$6. Additional vaccines available for dogs are Bordetella for \$10 and DA2PP for \$15. The feline leukemia vaccine will be offered for \$15. Town Launches Chat Bot to Improve Customer Service

Want to know when the next blood drive will be held? Need to know when Town Hall is open? Looking for the band line up for this year's Sunset Concert Series? We've got an answer for that...and you can find out day or night! Providing good customer service isn't limited to standard operating hours now that the Town of Apple Valley has launched a new communication tool on Facebook Messenger.

"The town has embraced this emerging technology to serve our residents better, and it will improve as more people use it," said Public Relations Specialist Charlene Engeron, who explained the answers are programmed based on the frequently asked questions staff receives. *Includes an additional materials fee

Simply click "get started" via Facebook Messenger on the Town's main Facebook page to subscribe. You can then submit questions and, in many cases, get an automatic response. If an answer hasn't been pre-programmed, staff will address the issue during normal operating hours. Additionally, you'll receive periodic messages straight to your in-box as news and events happen.

"It is important to note that the messaging system does not take the place of our formal citizen request management system," said Engeron. "We encourage residents to visit our website and click on the "Let Us Know" link at the top of any page for reporting issues like barking dogs or potholes that need to be filled."

LAFCO Approves North APPLE VALLEY ANNEXATION

The Town of Apple Valley has received approval by the Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) for San Bernardino County to annex approximately 1,365 acres in north Apple Valley.

"The annexation adds three miles of prime freeway frontage to the Town's boundaries," said Town Manager Doug Robertson. "The annexation area is a logical extension of the Town's continued growth."

The area is bounded by Interstate-15 to the west, Johnson Road to the south, Morro Road to the north, and Fairfield Road to the east. The approved area of annexation sits within the 2,775 acres formerly known as the "Golden Triangle." The Town first attempted to annex the Golden Triangle in 2009 but was unsuccessful. The latest annexation effort narrowed the area by carving out existing residences, which helped secure widespread support. The revised annexation area is entirely vacant today and represents less than half of the attempted annexation area of 2009.

A Fiscal Impact Analysis determined that the annexation will increase revenues to the Town and outpace the costs of services to the area. The Town will share property tax revenues with the County under their new "Share the Burden" tax allocation structure. As such, the Town is expected to receive 50% of the 9.5% tax rate.

The development standards and entitlement process for future projects, including public roads, will be brought under the Town's jurisdiction. The annexation area was pre-zoned in the 2009 General Plan Update. Council Expands RESIDENTIAL BUILDING OPPORTUNITIES

Are you a homeowner caring for elderly parents, adult children, or just looking to earn extra money from your property? Based upon recent state legislation, you may be allowed to build an Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) on your property.

The Town Council recently modified the building requirements for accessory dwellings, also known as a granny house or a second home, that can provide independent living for family members or others in need of affordable housing.

In March, the Town Council approved the Planning Commission's recommendation to adjust the size of accessory structures, including dwelling units, based upon lot size. The ordinance also included the following highlights:

- Effective date April 26, 2019
- Maximum size of the ADU is 50% of the footprint of the primary house, or 30% when attached to the primary house. Bigger units may be permitted on lots one acre or larger.
- Property owner must live on the property.
- The second house cannot be sold separately but can be rented out and have separate utility meters.
- Sewer may be required for properties under one acre in size.
- Building permits are required.

Every spring and summer there are many well-meaning animal lovers who leave their pets in vehicles while they shop or run errands without realizing that their beloved pet may end up suffering — or even dying — due to the effects of heatstroke.

"Even on mild days, with temperatures in the low to mid-70's, the temperature inside a parked car can quickly reach 100 degrees," said police spokesperson Joy Ballinger. "In warmer, 85-degree weather, temperatures can reach 120 degrees within a half hour, even if a car window is left open a crack."

Leaving an animal unattended in a vehicle under conditions that endanger the health or well-being of an animal due to heat, cold, lack of adequate ventilation, or lack of food or water, or other circumstances that could reasonably cause suffering, disability, or death is a crime. If you see an animal in distress, call Sheriff dispatch immediately at (760) 956-5001.

VACATION PROTECTION House Checks Available



Are you planning a vacation this summer? Make a call to the Apple Valley Police Department a part of your preparation. Thanks to the dedicated men and women of our Citizen Volunteer Unit, the police department conducts periodic checks of homes while residents are out of town for a period of up to 30 days per calendar year.

Uniformed citizen volunteers will visually inspect the perimeter of the home. If anything seems amiss, a deputy will be dispatched to assess the situation and, if necessary, take law enforcement action followed by a call to the homeowner.

Vacation house checks are a complimentary service to the citizens of Apple Valley. To request this service, complete the vacation house check form available at the front counter of the Apple Valley Police Department and return it at least two days before your vacation is to begin.

Corky's will occupy the former Johnny D's restaurant location at the corner of Bear Valley and Apple Valley roads. The remodeled building will include glass storefront enhancements and the clay tile roof will be replaced with a metal roof. A portion of the building will be demolished to make room for an outdoor dining patio. Overall, the remodel will provide a fresh updated look to the building and will better compliment the surrounding retail center.

"I grew up in the High Desert and attended high school here," said Mike Towles. "This is a special place for me and I still consider it my old stomping grounds. It just makes sense that our family-inspired concept would come full circle. It will be a great fit in Apple Valley."

Corky's anticipates hiring 60-80 individuals to help serve their guests when the restaurant opens later this year.

VISTA DEL SOL COMMUNITY RISES AGAIN

Construction has resumed on Vista Del Sol Community, a 126-lot subdivision in north Apple Valley along Choco Road. With 30 homes built and occupied in the gated community, the 96 remaining single-family homes will bring more inventory to home buyers seeking semi-custom homes in an area of Apple Valley that offers a rural lifestyle and dramatic landscapes.

The Vista Del Sol Community's last home was built in 2008. The latest phase consists of four semi-custom floor plans ranging from 2,508 to 3,396-square-feet of living area with three different building elevations per floor plan.

"Apple Valley's high quality of life makes it a great place to live. In fact, we've recently been voted best place to live eight years running," said Town Manager Doug Robertson. "It is great to see continued quality residential growth in Apple Valley."



Council to Consider BY-DISTRICT VOTING

The method for electing Town Council members may change significantly by the time you cast your next ballot. Currently, council members are elected through an at-large system, which means that electors from the entire Town vote for all council members.

In recent months, the Town Council has held two public hearings to discuss switching to a by-district voting system, where a council candidate must reside within an election district and is elected by only voters residing within that geographic area.

In recent years, several cities in California have been sued under the California Voter's Rights Act (CVRA) of 2002 by plaintiffs alleging that at-large election systems result in "racially polarized" voting. In January, the Town received a letter from Kevin Shenkman of Shenkman & Hughes, PC, alleging that the Town's at-large election system diluted the ability of certain protected classes of persons within the Town to elect candidates of their choice based on the CVRA.

"Transitioning to a by-district election system will cost approximately \$60,000, which is significantly less than the millions of dollars a potential lawsuit would cost," said Town Attorney Thomas Rice.

Future meetings and Public Hearings will be held to explain the districting process and discuss drawing district boundaries, a process that will require the Town to retain a demographic expert. Next steps will include publishing draft maps, tentatively set for completion by May 3.

Additional public hearings are tentatively scheduled for May 14 and June 11 to receive input regarding the maps and the proposed sequence of elections. In addition to the formal Public Hearings, four public workshops will be held between April and June to allow for additional public discourse on the process. The Town Council will then consider the ordinance at its July 23 regular meeting.

Social media is amazing! It connects people all over the globe. It allows us to have real-time conversations with family and friends. It keeps us up to date on current news and trends.

But you know what it isn't good for? Letting your local government employees know about a problem in the community.

"People mistakenly believe that posting a comment on Facebook is a formal way to report an issue to staff. Unfortunately, comments on social media don't create a case in our system that staff can follow up on," explained Code Enforcement Manager Guy Eisenbrey. "We care about our residents and want to be as responsive as possible. We simply need them to use the proper channels to let us know about an issue." One of the best ways for you to report public nuisances such as illegal dumping, potholes, graffiti and vandalism is to use our Citizen Request Management tool on our website. To ensure an issue gets addressed, simply visit www.AppleValley.org and click on the "Let Us Know" link at the top of any page.

Similarly, if you are out and about and need to report something you can use our handy "Go Request" app. This smartphone tool uses GPS technology to pinpoint the location of the problem you reported and even allows you to include a photograph.



APPLE VALLEY SUPER BLOOM

Red-Stem "Stork Billed" Filaree are one of the first flowers to appear after winter rains. Leaves are fem-like and form a rosette near the ground. The flowers are only about 1/4 inch in diameter and light pink to lavender in color with 5 petals and 5 sepals. The stems are reddish-colored and most of the plant is hairy. The common names of this plant largely describe the seed pod's beak-like appearance. They can be seen all over town, but are especially prevalent in northern Apple Valley's large open fields.
