A Better Way of Life

A BRIEF HISTORY OF APPLE VALLEY

Yes there WERE apples!


While we became an official Town when residents voted for incorporation in 1988, our history goes back much further. Local historians have found signs of Serrano Indian camps along the Mojave River in Apple Valley. They were already here when Father Francisco Garces arrived in 1776, as he established the Spanish missions throughout California. In the late 1800s, the Paiute Indians also migrated to this area. The Mojave River Trail hosted trappers, gold prospectors, pack mules and Mormon wagon trains—over 13,000 people passed through here between 1849 and 1859. It was in 1860 that the first cabin was built in Apple Valley by Silas Cox, and the first road was cut the following year.

In 1926 Sam Coldwell, Indian name, Lone Wolf, garnered the help of 250 volunteers from Pacific Bell to establish a retreat for World War One vets recovering from mustard gas. The Lone Wolf Colony, still used for recuperative purposes, remains on Bear Valley Rd. in it's original location.

Some say the name "Apple Valley" originated from The Appleton Land Company that was based in this area in the early 1900s. Ursula Poates, one of the first settlers in the area, is credited with saying, "There were some apples being raised along the river in those early days, but not by the ton, so I just cut it down and called it Apple Valley!" By 1920, apples were being grown by the ton at award-winning orchards. Unfortunately, with the Great Depression and the cost of pumping water for irrigation, the orchards died off in the 1930s.

With a pleasant climate and lots of land, many types of ranches were built in the area, including health ranches and guest ranches. People would come to Apple Valley to enjoy the western lifestyle where they could ride horses, attend rodeos and just get away from the big city.

The modern founders of Apple Valley were Newton T. Bass and B.J. "Bud" Westlund, who were partners in the oil and gas industry in Long Beach, CA. Westlund and Bass formed the Apple Valley Ranchos Land Co. in 1946. They built the Apple Valley Inn and Hilltop House, and invited famous celebrities of Hollywood to come visit. Within ten years there were banks, churches and a school, along with a golf course, hospital and 180 businesses.

Sign, sign, everywhere a sign!



"Roadside litter," they have been deemed by the press. "Illegal," they have been deemed by the Municipal Code. No matter what you call them, yard sale signs posted on street corners, street signs, telephone poles, parked cars and cardboard boxes are a visual nuisance and source of litter in our community. Last year 7,507 such signs were removed by Code Enforcement!

These illegal postings clutter our corners, block motorists views, and eventually fade and come loose, creating unsightly trash. Here's a short tutorial on the Apple Valley Municipal Codes regarding yard sales and yard sale signs:

- A person must have a yard sale permit to conduct a yard sale.
- Yard sales are limited to three per year, per single family residence (houses) and one per unit, per year, for multi-family housing (apartments).
- 3) Off site signage for yard sales is prohibited,

meaning signs may not be posted anywhere but on the property where the yard sale is being held.

Current enforcement includes removal of any off-site signage. If there are excessive signs, a complaint, or excessive yard sales, yard sale abuse or non-compliance can be cited.

Yard sale permits are completely free, and are available at the Town Hall Reception and Information desk.

The best way to attract garage sale customers is by placing an ad in local papers or online where more people who are looking for yard sales will see it.

Town offers 0% interest home repair loan

Apple Valley residents in the incorporated area of the Town may qualify for a 30-year-deferred, 0% interest loan, for up to \$20,000. Homeowners must be low to moderate income; for example, a household of two is limited to \$42,650 annual gross income (AGI); a household of four is limited to \$53,300 AGI.

Known as the Residential Rehabilitation Loan Program (RRLP), the program provides money to address health and safety code violations, replacement of major house components, energy conservation, weatherization improvements, accessibility improvements and deferred maintenance. Eligible items include, but are not limited to: roofing, heating and air conditioning, evaporative coolers, doors and windows, painting, flooring, insulation, plumbing, and electrical work.

There are no required payments during the 30 year term of loan, but payment would be due if the property is sold, transferred, no longer the primary residence or refinanced for cash out. The applicant must complete an application packet and provide evidence of income, show responsible credit history, and be current on house payments, property taxes and insurance.

Residents interested in participating in the RRLP loan program may call Denise Bossard at (760) 240-7000 ext. 7913 for further information. The program has been very popular and typically has a waiting list.
