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Public facilities on schedule

We're going vertical! That's construction lingo that means that our new public facilities are taking shape. Grading and foundation are complete on both the animal shelter and the town hall annex, and framing and walls are now going up.

The animal shelter site is on the southeast corner of Powhattan and Quinnault. The 36,000 square-foot facility will house state-of-the-art features providing better care of our animals, and foster an environment to promote education and adoption. Completion is expected by winter of 2010.

The town hall annex is adjacent to the current town hall. The 25,000 square-foot expansion will house Development Services, including Building and Safety, Engineering, Planning and Economic Development.

It will also include a 6,000 square foot community meeting space. This area will feature a raised platform stage, audio/visual equipment and seat as many as 300 people. Moveable walls will also allow for smaller group settings. The building should open by late spring of 2010.

Funding has come from a combination of redevelopment agency funds and certificates of participation earmarked specifically for these projects. With the current state of the economy, dollars spent in construction go much farther than they did a few years ago, and both projects came in significantly below estimates. Using a multiple prime bidding process, rather than going out for one bid for a general contractor, individual trades had an expanded opportunity to get in on these jobs, and a number of high desert businesses were successful.

Between salaries, construction costs and other "trickle down" factors, the economic impact of these two projects combined are injecting nearly \$42 million into the local economy.

Town Council adopts balanced budget for 09/10

In spite of the turmoil of economic conditions across the state and the nation, the Town of Apple Valley remains well-positioned to maintain current levels of service to our residents. The Town Council adopted a \$108 million budget in June, an increase of about 3% over the previous year. Of this, the general fund accounts for \$18.4 million, an 8.6% decrease from 08/09.

The general fund represents the only unrestricted funds that can be used for the day-to-day operations of the town. The primary source of general fund revenue is local taxes – property, sales and vehicle license fees. While we project these revenues to decrease slightly this year, the Town was able to reduce expenditures as well, without impacting the services we provide. Because of our relatively recent retail boom – with the majority of our retail development occurring since 2005 – a reduction in sales tax revenue does not hit us as hard as some other municipalities.

The majority of the Town's budget is in restricted funds. For example, road improvement or

Measure I revenue can only be spent on certain road projects. Redevelopment funds must be used for projects that fall within defined areas and serve certain purposes. In 2009-2010, the Town expects to spend nearly \$11 million on road projects and planning, including approximately \$1.7 million on general resurfacing. Among the road work planned for the coming year is a complete rehabilitation of Corwin Road, major work on Waalew Road, and traffic signals on Bear Valley Road at Deep Creek and at Mohawk.

Finally, the Town Council is committed to maintaining public safety. No cuts have been made to police services, and we have identified a grant opportunity that may allow us to add three additional deputies.

The complete budget will be available on the Town's website by early August, or you can review a printed copy at Town Hall.

Local information on crime now available online

The San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department has launched Community Crime Mapping, an online program available to the public. The program is easy to use and even includes a tutorial.

"A well-informed public has always been an essential element in the Sheriff's Department's fight against crime," said Sheriff Rod Hoops.

Users have several options such as viewing clusters of crime activity, analyzing patterns within a specific area, determining the distance to any crime from their address and more. Users can now sign-up for crime alerts which notify the user by email when a crime has occurred in an assigned neighborhood.

Community Crime Mapping is a nationwide service, but the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department is the first law enforcement agency in Southern California to subscribe. The program is a good resource for business owners, as well. Crime data is extracted daily so that information is always current.

Town offers 0% interest home repair loan

Do you have a fixer-upper, but no funds? Apple Valley residents in the incorporated area of the Town may qualify for a 30-year deferred, 0% interest loan for up to \$20,000 for qualified repairs. Homeowners must be low- to moderate-income; for example, a household of two is limited to \$42,650 annual gross income (AGI); a household of four is limited to \$53,300 AGI.

Known as the Residential Rehabilitation Loan Program (RRLP), the program provides money to address health and safety code violations, energy conservation, weatherization, accessibility and deferred maintenance. Eligible items include, but are not limited to: roofing, heating and air conditioning, evaporative coolers, doors and windows, painting, flooring, insulation, plumbing, and electrical work.

There are no required payments during the 30-year term of loan, but the loan becomes due if the property is sold, transferred, no longer the primary residence or refinanced for cash out. The applicant must complete an application packet and provide evidence of income, show responsible credit history, and be current on house payments, property taxes and insurance.

Great program for first time homebuyers

Connecting eligible first time homebuyers with foreclosed properties, the Town of Apple Valley is offering 0% interest loans for down payment assistance. Funded by the Housing and Economic Recovery Act, the program reduces the blight of vacant homes and helps low-income families put down roots.

Town assistance is provided as a 0% interest, 45-year deferred loan. There are no monthly payments made on the deferred loan. Interested buyers should contact a Town-approved participating lender to be pre-qualified for a conventional fixed rate first mortgage.

Buyers will work with their realtor and one of the Town's participating lenders to select homes in the eligible target area. - Don't use the toilet as a wastebasket.
