When disaster strikes

April was Disaster Preparedness Month, but preparing for an emergency is year round work. Now is the time to take action that could save your life and the lives of those you love.

BEFORE DISASTER STRIKES

Create a plan with your family. Know the safest routes out of the house, and who you will call in case you can't reach each other, such as an out of state family member. Learn your school's plan for evacuations and student pick-up.

An emergency kit is essential. A kit for your car should have what you need for short term survival:

bottled water, food (granola bars, trail mix, MRE's, non-perishable snacks), a first aid kit (band-aids, antiseptic wipes, pain relievers, medications, personal hygiene items), a flash light with extra batteries, gloves, and disposable face masks. Throw in a blanket and a roll or two of toilet paper and keep it all in a small duffel bag in the trunk.



WHEN DISASTER HITS

Remain calm and patient. Listen to the radio or television for news and instructions. Check for injuries and get help for seriously injured people. If the disaster occurs while you are home, check for damage using a flashlight. Do not light matches or candles or turn on electrical switches. Check for fires, fire hazards and other household hazards. Sniff for gas leaks, starting at the water heater. If you smell gas or suspect a leak, turn off the main gas valve, open windows, and get everyone outside quickly. Shut off any other damaged utilities. Confine or secure your pets. Call your family contact and then do not use the telephone again unless it is a life threatening emergency. Check on your neighbors, especially those who are elderly or disabled.

Basic emergency supply kit:

- Water: One gallon per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
- Food: At least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries; wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- First aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Dust masks; plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
- Local maps

Additional items to consider adding:

- Prescription medications and glasses
- Infant formula and diapers
- Pet food and extra water for your pet
- Copies of important documents (insurance policies, identification, bank account records in a waterproof container)
- Cash or traveler's checks and change
- Emergency reference material such as a first aid book or information from www.ready.gov
- Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person.
- Change of clothing including a long sleeved shirt, long pants and sturdy shoes.
- Household chlorine bleach and medicine dropper. When diluted nine parts water to one part bleach, bleach can be used as a disinfectant. Or in an emergency, you can use it to treat water by using 16 drops of regular household liquid bleach per gallon of water. Do not use scented, color safe or bleaches with added cleaners.
- Fire extinguisher
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Feminine supplies and personal hygiene items
- Mess kits, paper cups, plates and plastic utensils, paper towels
- Paper and pencil
- Books, games, puzzles or other activities for children

Sewer odor control study underway

The Town of Apple Valley, in conjunction with the Victor Valley Wastewater Reclamation Authority, is conducting an Odor Control Study of the sewer collection system along Highway 18. The study seeks a solution to a recurring issue of sewer odor in certain areas along the main interceptor.

The Town has a proactive odor abatement program that includes the use of odor counteractants that are applied to the system in various locations. Until recently, this has been mostly successful at alleviating sewer odors; however, finding a long-term solution to the underlying cause of the sewer odor problem has always been a priority.

The Town and VVWRA have contracted with V&A Consulting Engineers to evaluate and identify the underlying cause of the odors. For the first phase of the study (April 17 - May 5), the Town stopped current odor treatments to measure the flow and odor levels at a number of locations. When the data collection was complete, the odor treatment was re-instated.

The entire study will take approximately one year. Later phases will include pilot tests of proposed abatement measures.
