First Drop in the Bucket Makes a Big Splash!



The new pool opened on August 31.

Three-hundred and thirty-thousand gallons of cool clean water (filled free, courtesy of Apple Valley Ranchos Water Company) await the community in our recently completed public pool! The facility is part of the 22-

acre master planned Civic Center Park just north of Town Hall on Dale Evans Parkway. The multi-use pool is up to 10 feet deep and 25 meters by 25 yards. "Building the aquatic center in phases makes it possible to provide swimming opportunities for the residents of Apple Valley now, even though the park itself

is not complete," said Bruce Williams, Town Manager. Future phases include a zero-entry (ADA accessible) wading pool and children's water play feature.

Following the grand opening on August 31, Parks and

Recreation began offering aquatics programs over Labor Day weekend. For more information on open swim, lap swim, parent-tot classes and water aerobics, please call (760)240-7880. Participants under 18 must have a waiver signed by a parent on file. Kids under 10 must be accompanied by an adult for open swim. Children three and under must wear swim diapers. No flotation devices or "swimmies" are allowed.

Retail booming in Apple Valley

After years of knocking on doors, national retailers at long last have discovered the untapped market in Apple Valley. Counting projects under construction, permitted or in the entitlement phase, Apple Valley is in the process of adding nearly two million square feet of retail space.

Lowe's and Stater Bros. opened in December at the intersection of Apple Valley and Bear Valley Roads. The Mojave River Crossings anchored by The Home Depot is well under way, and the next phase of the Jess Ranch Marketplace will break ground in September. Other tenants opened or expected at this intersection include Walgreens, Rite Aid, Wendy's, Ouiznos, Pizza Factory, Linko

Japanese Restaurant, It's a Grind, Starbucks and a variety of other services and eateries.

Jess Ranch Marketplace Phase II, located on the east side of Jess Ranch Parkway, was approved in June and includes 312, 000 square feet of retail. The center will include Mervyn's, Pet Smart, and WinCo Foods, as well as office supplies, home goods and other common retail needs.

Lewis Retail Centers broke ground in August on the Apple Valley Commons, a 650,000 square foot center on Highway 18 and Dale Evans Parkway. Super-Target, a grocerygeneral merchandise hybrid, has been identified as the primary anchor and expects to be open by summer of 2007. Lowe's has indicated they will open a second Apple Valley store at this location while other tenants have expressed a strong interest including Linens 'n Things, Bed, Bath and Beyond, Best Buy, Circuit City and TJ Maxx, along with three sit-down restaurants and other eateries.

Across Dale Evans Parkway, plans for the Wal-Mart Super Center are progressing rapidly. A development permit application has been submitted, and Wal-Mart is currently conducting an environmental impact report, expected back by early fall. Also breaking ground in September will be the Apple Valley Plaza with Ultra Star Cinemas, at Bear Valley and Central.

Strength in Numbers - Disaster Service Workers Growing Stronger

Apple Valley is fortunate to have a growing number of residents trained to help during a major emergency or disaster. Now almost 200 strong, Apple Valley disaster service workers take the time to be trained and prepare to help themselves, their families, and the community when it is needed most.

Currently there are three volunteer groups managed by the Apple Valley Emergency Preparedness Program.

- 1. C.E.R.T. -- Community Emergency Response Team
- 2. E.C.S. -- Emergency Communications Services (ham radio operators)
- 3. F.A.D.D. -- Friends of Animals During Disasters

Each volunteer is trained in his/her area of interest prior to registering as a Disaster Service Worker. They are then encouraged to participate in drills/exercises, attend additional training, and be ready to respond.

Given a community the size of Apple Valley, having close to 200 trained volunteers who are willing to step forward to help during a disaster is truly overwhelming -- they are a great group of people! If you know a C.E.R.T., E.C.S., or F.A.D.D. volunteer, thank them for their continued service to your community.

Apple Valley Round-Up Days returns!

There's a tale to be told about a golden horseshoe hidden deep in a desert canyon . . .

It all begins with an old-fashioned **Steak Fry** held on Thursday night, September 14. At the Historic Apple Valley Inn, the country folk will be getting their caricatures drawn and enjoying real down-home cooking, live country music, door prizes, a no-host bar and raffle drawings. The "Country Doctors" will be laying down a boogie and the crowd kicking up their feet

It is said that amid the celebration, four horses get loose from their hitching post in front of Apple Valley Inn. Eleven silver and one golden horseshoe grace the hooves of those sneaky equines. With freedom on their mind they gallop wildly, losing their valuable shoes in the canyons of Horseman's Center that fateful night.

On Friday, September 15, Horseman's Center gate will open at 4 p.m., and the 58-year-old tradition of **Round-Up Days** continues. High Desert dwellers get their first chance to find one of those lucky horseshoes while enjoying the carnival rides, a western town front and stunt show, country shopping, music, a magic show and storytelling. Silver horseshoes found in the park can be returned to the Town of Apple Valley booth in exchange for event t-shirts and town treasures. The **Golden Horseshoe** is worth \$100 cash both Friday and Saturday! Those horseshoes found on Friday get returned to hidden locations in the park and if the golden shoe is left unfound, its value doubles to \$200 on Saturday! An assortment of grub will be served up, from BBQ and beer to snow cones and sausage.

No rest for the weary on Saturday! You'll have to skedaddle to fit in all the fun! Rising with the sun is the **Round-Up Run** at Brewster Park starting at 7:30 a.m. Entries are \$12.50 for pre-registration, \$15 on the day of the event and walkers are free! Check in starts at 6:45 a.m. For entry information call Parks and Recreation at 240-7880.

Bring your family for some hearty chow before you sit down for the next round of entertainment. The **Kiwanis Club Pancake Breakfast** is in the front parking lot of Mollies from 7 a.m. to 10 a.m. for just a \$5 donation.

The celebration gets a move-on at 9 a.m. with the **Round-Up Days Parade** down Highway 18 in the Village. Themed "Git Along Lil' Doggie" the Town is inviting all folks to bring the pups along for this Saturday stroll in historic Apple Valley, but please keep your furry friends on a leash and be sure to pick up after them. The parade features local drill teams, marching units, bands, floats, classic vehicles, dancers, novelty acts and entertainers. The parade will be led by Grand Marshal and Mayor, the Honorable Mark Shoup. On Saturday, Horseman's Center reopens at 11 a.m. with more live music, carnival rides, games, crafts, grub and a whole lot more. The search for that horseshoe continues 'til 10 p.m.!

When the dust settles on Sunday the Apple Valley Equestrian Association will get up with the roosters to host a **Cowboy Breakfast** at 7 a.m. at Horseman's Center. A two to three hour trail ride through the local hills follows at 9 a.m. Bring your own horse and RSVP to Michelle at 240-5333. If you're still rarin' to go, the carnival will continue into Sunday and go down with the sunset. Carnival pre-sale tickets are available at Town Hall and the Chamber of Commerce; buying them in advance at \$10 for 20 tickets saves you \$8. Friday is wristband night for \$18.

Roads remain top priority

Transportation/Circulation is the number one Vision 2010 priority in the Town of Apple Valley. In the 2006-07 budget, the Town Council has earmarked \$17.5 million for road projects. Of that, \$12.7 million will continue the work on the Apple Valley Road Improvement Project. In addition to completing the widening to Yucca Loma Road, repaving from Yucca Loma to Highway 18 will start by the end of the year. After that, Apple Valley Road will be extended from its north end, connecting with Falchion Road and the I-15 frontage road.

In July, work was completed on four traffic signals at key intersections between Yucca Loma Road and Highway 18. Residents have already reported slower traffic speeds and decreased wait times to enter Apple Valley Road from side roads and driveways, increasing the safety of both drivers and residents.

Yucca Loma Bridge

While the plan is still to widen the full length of Apple Valley Road to four lanes, it is clear that the interim improvements will handle traffic needs for the foreseeable future. With rapidly escalating cost estimates to complete Apple Valley Road to a 4lane configuration, the Town Council took a step back to review the most critical circulation need - east/west access. As a result, Apple Valley Road plans were modified and the Yucca Loma Bridge has been reaffirmed as the number one transportation priority. The Yucca Loma Bridge/Nisqualli-La Mesa Interchange Task Force has been formed and in April the Town hired a consultant to manage the environmental clearance and entitlement processes, to be completed by December 2007. The task of raising the needed \$80 million, while challenging, is made easier by the fact that this project has regional significance for traffic movement across the entire valley. Apple Valley, Victorville, CalTrans and the County

are all on board. The project crosses legislative districts and all players are pointed in one direction over the river and across the freeway.

Other Road Projects

Yucca Loma Bridge is a few years away, but this year the Town's Engineering Division found an immediate fix for congestion at Highway 18 and Apple Valley Road. Thanks to the addition of a free right-turn lane, and the lengthening of the dual left turn lane pockets, eastbound traffic now flows freely at all hours of the day. The Town is also working with CalTrans on plans to widen Highway 18 to 3 lanes in each direction from the Narrows to Tao Road.


