Finance 101- the Town budget explained

Most people celebrate the start of a new year in January, but for Town Hall, it's New Year's in July! A new fiscal year, that is, with a new budget taking effect on July 1. For 2007-08, the Town has adopted a \$117 million budget, a 63% increase over last year. Of this, the general fund accounts for \$19.4 million dollars.

The general fund represents the only unrestricted funds that can be used for the day-to-day operations of the Town. The primary source of general funds is local taxes – property, sales and vehicle license fees. Many people do not realize, though, that for each \$1000 you pay in property taxes, the town receives only \$4.65 of unrestricted funds and \$4.06 for parks and recreation. For sales tax, we receive only one cent

The primary expenditure is the law enforcement contract with the San Bernardino Sheriff, accounting for 49%. We added one new deputy this year, following the addition of six deputies last year, bringing our total to 55 sworn officers.

The majority of the Town's budget is in restricted funds. For example, money accumulated through development impact fees on construction can only be spent to mitigate those impacts. Sewer impact fees are being used to update the sewer master plan, as well as expand sewer infrastructure. Traffic impact fees are spent on road improvements.

This year the Town will spend \$31 million on roads.

Major projects include:

- Apple Valley Road: completion of widening between
- Kiowa Road: widening from Sitting Bull to Yucca Loma, to include center turn lane and bike lanes.
- Navajo Road: widening to include center turn lane and bike lanes from Highway 18 to Waalew Road.
- Annual Pavement Management: variety of slurry seal and overlay projects, according to the prioritized pavement management program.

Community Clean Up Day


