Committee seeking Apple Valley history

The Historical Advisory Committee (HAC) of the Town of Apple Valley completed the long-term project of publishing the "Historical Points of Interest" booklet last year, but they are by no means resting on their laurels! The committee includes Chairperson Al Bush, Vice-Chair Joan Lopez, Bill Bascom, Art Bolding, Debi Trudeau, James Woody and Carl Mason.

The HAC continues to collect artifacts and stories on the colorful history of our Town. Their current project is to name and decorate the six Town Hall conference rooms according to chosen historic themes. Items they are specifically seeking for this purpose include photographs or memorabilia of equestrian activities such as the Dancing Hooves, rodeos and the Livery Stables. Also, photos of celebrities known to have lived in or frequented the area and photos and information about early guest ranches.

If you have any information, artifacts, memorabilia or personal recollections on any topic related to Apple Valley, we would love to hear about it. Donations are graciously accepted. In the case of printed material, we can make copies if you prefer to retain the original.

Another ongoing task of the HAC is answering frequent inquiries on Apple Valley history. The committee draws on the Victor Valley Museum, the Victor Valley College Local History Collection, and the Mohahve Historical Society, along with long time residents and a store of resources to answer people's questions. However, we've recently come across a plaque that has us asking the questions!

In a storage room in our very own Community Center, an employee discovered a plaque that reads, "This fountain dedicated in loving memory of Capt. Lyle N. Leavitt USAF. Born June 1, 1917, who was active in the early growth of this community in Apple Valley. Killed in service to his country August 23, 1950."

We have newspaper articles about his pending move to Apple Valley in 1948, and about his death in a plane crash near El Mirage in 1950. People involved with the Park District at that time recall a water fountain dedicated in front of the community center. However we do not have any photographs, any indication as to the date the fountain was dedicated, or information as to the role he played in the early growth of Apple Valley.

Department Highlight: Apple Valley Police

The Town of Apple Valley was pleased to welcome Captain John McMahon, our new police chief, in April. It is definitely familiar territory for Captain McMahon, having spent 17 years of his youth in Apple Valley, even graduating from Apple Valley High School in 1982. He comes to us with 18 years experience with the San Bernardino County Sheriff, most recently as the commander of the central detention center.

Always with an eye on efficient use of resources, the Town of Apple Valley Police Department is utilizing reserve officers and Citizen on Patrol (COP) volunteers for many functions, providing valuable services to the community while freeing up deputies for patrol and more serious matters.

School attendance and juvenile crime: Reserve deputies Rich Cambridge and Howard Beck contribute 30 to 40 hours each week to curb truancy and teach kids to avoid drugs. Reserve Deputy Cambridge works with the Let's End Truancy (LET) program in the elementary school. He and COPs visit the homes of chronically truant kids, motivating the kids and educating parents on the importance of attendance. Among this group, attendance has improved approximately 30%.

Both Cambridge and Beck are involved with the Junior DARE Program (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) in the elementary schools, teaching kids about drugs, stranger awareness and other safety issues. Beck also assists with traffic control at various schools, five days a week.

Finger printing and bicycle registration: Manned by COPs, the Town of Apple Valley offers free children's fingerprinting and bicycle registration at the Police Substation, located at 21989 Highway 18 #2, just behind "A Flower Cart." It is open the 1st and 3rd Saturdays from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm.

Special events: A visit to almost any Town event - like the Freedom Festival and Jazz Night in July - will reveal reserve deputies and COPs helping in many functions. From traffic and parking control, to walking the grounds to serving pizza at Teen Scene - the event staff is grateful for the assistance of these volunteers.

Town opens official Town store

Golf shirts, license plate frames and key chains are just a few of the logo items now available from "Town Treasures," the official Town store. A display cabinet in the lobby of Town Hall showcases many items promoting "Take Pride in Apple Valley," as well as other programs including Sister City and the Historical Points of Interest. Retired street signs are also sold through "Town Treasures."

Store proceeds benefit AVCRF

Proceeds from the store benefit the Apple Valley Community Resource Foundation, a corporation for public charitable purposes under the umbrella of the Town. AVCRF allows the Town to seek grant opportunities from private sources that only fund non-profit agencies. The Town of Apple Valley encourages residents to use water wisely, and offers the following tips to help conserve this critical natural resource:

- Water in several short sessions to allow water to soak in.
- Avoid runoff by positioning sprinklers to land on lawn and shrubs, not on sidewalks and streets.
- During the summer, water lawns late at night or early morning to avoid evaporation.
- Practice "grasscycling." Set your lawnmower to cut only a third of the grass height, and leave the clippings on the lawn to decompose. This reduces the amount of fertilizer and water needed by the lawn.
- For long-term water savings, plant native or drought-tolerant plants that require less water and fertilizer. Use micro and drip irrigation systems with mulch to retain water.
