# Freedom Festival celebrates the USA

Enjoy the "Great Wide Open" this Independence Day at the Lenny Brewster Sports Center from 2 – 9 p.m. on Sunday, July 4 with Room at the Top, a Tom Petty tribute band taking the stage from 6:30-9 p.m. All day park festivities include the Apple Valley Fire District Jr. Combat Challenge, multiple bounce houses and inflatable games, and a wide array of merchandise for sale. The Victor Valley Sunrise Rotary beer garden will be complemented by food booths including irresistible funnel cakes, kettle corn, fresh lemonade and barbecue.

Wear white and get a patriotic tie-dye or just cool off at 3 p.m. with the Water Spectacular featuring red, white and blue water "Free Falling" from fire hoses pointed towards the sky. Our opening band is as hot as a desert afternoon, when Caliente plays from 2 to 4:15. The National Anthem and Color Guard Presentation will be at 6 p.m. and includes a performance by one of our Apple Valley Idol Winners. retirement ceremony at 3 p.m. And it may sound "Too Good to be True" but we have the best fireworks show in the desert choreographed to music starting at 9 p.m.

Lenny Brewster Sports Center is located at 21024 Otoe Road. Take Dale Evans Parkway 1.5 miles north from Highway 18. The park features 40 acres of grass, a playground and horseshoe pits. Bring your canopies and chairs, but please, no alcohol, pets or barbecues will be allowed in the park.

You can meet these requirements at a low-cost rabies clinic Wednesday, June 16 from 5 to 7 p.m. Rabies shots are \$6 each (cash only) and will be given at the Town of Apple Valley Animal Shelter, 22131 Powhatan Road, on the corner of Quinnault. # Road construction ahead

### Town continues investment in public facilities

Located adjacent to the existing Town Hall, a new Town Hall Annex is nearing completion. The building will house Economic Development and Housing, Planning, Engineering, Building and Safety and Municipal Operations. All will move into the new building in early July, providing a one-stop shop for all development permitting activity.



One exciting feature is the community room – 6,000

square feet which will be available for rent for business meetings, banquets and private events. A catering kitchen provides warming ovens, refrigerators and food preparation area. A separate lobby entrance allows for use after normal Town Hall hours. The room can hold as many as 300, or be divided into two smaller rooms. The space also comes equipped with sound and projection systems. In addition, a large conference room will be available for rent for business meetings up to 22 people. Located off the same lobby as the community room, the conference room can also be used after normal Town Hall hours.

The lobby will proudly display one of only a handful of mint condition wall-sized maps from the early days of the Apple Valley Ranchos Development Company. The nearly 8-foot square map is being donated by long time Apple Valley resident Mike "Tex" Meeken. Tex was one of the original Ranchos salesmen, and the map has been rolled and stored safely since the 1950s never framed or displayed.

The space vacated in the original Town Hall will be filled by other departments shifting into more suitable quarters, including Parks and Recreation, Code Enforcement and records storage.

An open house for the new facility will be held soon. Check www.AppleValley.org for more information. O
