

The Town of Apple Valley Parks and Recreation Department offers an amazing variety of programs for all ages. In 2010 alone, we processed 13,621 program registrations! From after school programs and adult softball, to hip hop and healthy cooking classes, from winery tours to water aerobics - we truly offer something for everyone.

We also provide places for creating your own recreation experience. With 198 acres of parks, you can get away from the distractions of everyday life with family barbeques, playing ball on our fields or just taking a stroll.

Civic Center Park, our premier event park, is now home to the newest and largest playground in the High Desert. The playground opened in February and has separate structures for toddlers and older kids, swings, climbing walls, rope amenities and so much more. With a capacity of over 200 kids, the playground adds an active play area to our premiere park. The next few months will see the installation of a permanent restroom, additional benches and picnic tables as well as a dog park. All of this should be done by the time the Sunset Concert Series starts up again in June.

Improvements are also happening at James Woody

Park. The outdated cinderblock dugouts on our ball fields have been replaced with cleaner, safer chainlink, just in time for the start of Little League. Additionally, an extension and renovation to the 3-Diamond Skate Park is underway. When completed, the new facility will be able to accommodate BMX bikes, as well as skateboards and skates, to become a complete action sport facility. Watch for information about a grand reopening in April.

The Town is also nearing completion of an update to its Parks and Recreation Master Plan. This strategic document will help us determine our parks and facilities needs for the next twenty years, including where they are needed and how we can get them done. Over the last year, we have solicited input from the community through our website, at special events, and at public workshops. Soon, we will be conducting a phone survey. If you get a call, please take a minute to answer the questions. Your input is important to us and will ensure that we can continue to offer "A Better Way to Live and Play" in Apple Valley. Tap into local government from your smart phone

Potholes that need filling, barking dogs that need quieting, and graffiti that needs removing can now be reported using Android smart phones with the launch of the Town of Apple Valley "GO Request" application.

Android smart phone users simply open the app, select an issue, and take a picture – when you tap the send button, your

Android smart phone application sends a photo and the precise location directly to the right person who can easily find and fix the issue. You can now truly connect with someone who can help – on the go and around the clock – all from your phone. The Android smart phone application follows last year's release of our iPhone app.

The GPS and camera features built into the Android smart phones make it simple for you to alert Apple Valley officials about a variety of issues while you're mobile. You'll know that your issue went to the right person, and you can also receive status updates on your issues.

Download the free Android smart phone application by searching for GORequest in the Market.

The Android app is the latest enhancement to Apple Valley's citizen relationship management (CRM) solution from Government Outreach, Inc. Apple Valley already uses the GORequest iPhone app and has made the CRM system available for Black Berry and Palm as well.

Who ya gonna call?

Got a problem in your neighborhood? Code Enforcement not only enforces regulations, but cleans up graffiti, and removes abandoned dump sites, illegal signage and road hazards. They inspect rental properties and secure investigation sites. In 2010 Code Enforcement opened over 6,500 cases and cleaned up over 162,000 pounds of trash from fields, yards and along our roadways.

Grant-funded community collection events brought in 74 mattresses, 58 appliances, and 5,653 tires, which otherwise may have been abandoned in our desert. Free to all property owners, our Graffiti Abatement is one of the best and our contractor expertly color matches all surfaces. The Code Enforcement staff takes great pride in their job; they are essentially the cleaning crew for our community. Single-use plastic bags are becoming a thing of the past. In an effort to put a stop to plastic pollution, the San Bernardino Zero Waste Communities (ZWC) is launching a Reusable Bag Campaign to encourage residents to stop single plastic bag use and grab a reusable bag instead.

Using a reusable bag greatly

reduces unwanted waste in landfills
and pollution in our cities. So why do people
continue to use these single-use plastic bags if they
harm our environment? ZWC survey results across the County
indicated two main obstacles: forgetting to bring reusable bags

indicated two main obstacles; forgetting to bring reusable bags, and leaving reusable bags in the car at the grocery store.

To help alleviate these obstacles and to encourage reusable bag use, ZWC partnered with several grocery stores to implement the Reusable Bag Campaign. These stores will remind customers to use reusable bags and applaud the ones that do. Signs in the parking lots will remind residents to grab their bag before leaving their car. School presentations and other outreach efforts will help spread the word to all family members.

While Apple Valley doesn't have one of the grocery store pilot programs yet, the campaign still serves as a good reminder to pass on the plastic. Don't use them at the grocery store, and don't dispose of them in your blue recycle cans.

The Zero Waste Communities of San Bernardino County is made up of 16 cities and the County of San Bernardino, including Apple Valley. They have partnered to educate their residents and businesses on waste reduction, reuse, and recycling. 

Apple Valley sees results with RDA


Apple Valley Commons. Jess Ranch Marketplace. Walmart Distribution Center. More than 5,600 jobs. These are just a few of the outcomes from the effective administration of Redevelopment Agency (RDA) dollars in the Town of Apple Valley.

The State of California is threatening to dissolve RDAs across the board. However, in a report presented to the California Redevelopment Association, it is clear we have made wise use of this important resource. In addition, a number of critical projects would be brought to a screeching halt should the ill-advised proposal come to pass.

From 2004 through today, the Town has invested \$55 million of RDA funds, which in turn has generated \$394 million in project expenditures

through our development partners, and an economic impact of \$739 million. This means each \$1 million invested has resulted in a \$13.4 million economic impact. The Town can also attribute more than 5,600 jobs to our RDA investments – a figure that translates to only \$9,749 per job created.

The largest project, providing as many as 1,100 jobs, is the Walmart Distribution Center. Built in 2004, it was the first recipient of RDA funds, which were used to help acquire a portion of the property they built on. This investment paved the way for the formation of the 5,100-acre North Apple Valley Industrial Specific Plan, an area expected to provide 38,000 jobs at build-out. Construction of additional backbone infrastructure would already be underway if not for the state raid of almost \$4 million from AVRDA last year, and will be postponed indefinitely should RDAs be eliminated.



Investing locally for the long term: Other RDA projects focused on the installation of backbone infrastructure such as roads, storm drains and traffic signals. RDA dollars assist business development by defraying the overall cost of the project; however, the Town still owns the infrastructure. These public improvements help the community as a whole, providing improved traffic flow, as well as the commercial development that may not have happened otherwise.

The Town was also fortunate to have the opportunity to fund a municipal animal shelter as well as a public works facility (currently under construction) through the redevelopment mechanism. The facilities fall squarely within a redevelopment area. The surrounding light industrial area will be served well with the location of these well-designed municipal buildings. Studies have shown that such uses raise the visibility and property values of surrounding development. \bigcirc

Town offers 0% interest home repair loan

Does your house have repair needs but you're short on cash? Apple Valley homeowners may qualify for a 30-year deferred, 0% interest loan for up to \$20,000 for eligible repairs. Homeowners must be within Town boundaries and must be low- to moderate-income. For example, a household of two is limited to \$41,600 annual gross income (AGI); a household of four is limited to \$52,000 AGI.

Known as the Residential Rehabilitation Loan Program (RRLP), the program provides money to address health, safety and code violation issues, energy conservation, weatherization, accessibility and deferred maintenance. Eligible items include, but are not limited to: roofing, heating and air conditioning, evaporative coolers, doors and windows, painting, flooring, insulation, plumbing, and electrical work.

There are no required payments during the 30-year term of loan, but the loan becomes due if the property is sold, transferred, no longer the primary residence or refinanced for cash out. The applicant must complete an application packet and provide evidence of income, show responsible credit history, and be current on house payments, property taxes and insurance.

The program has been very successful and is currently funded for the 2010/2011 program year. Crime-free program expands to businesses

Reducing crime on rental property presents a unique challenge for law enforcement. Most renters don't have the same commitment to their neighborhood as homeowners, or motivation to improve safety. At the first sign of criminal activity renters can just give notice, pack up and leave.

Property owners and managers are placed in the difficult position of dealing with difficult tenants, and have nowhere to turn when they come up against a criminal element. Owners often aren't aware of their rights when it comes to crimes committed on the property.

The solution has been the Crime Free Programs: a coalition of police, property managers, and residents of rental properties working together to keep crime out of their area. The Crime Free program doesn't imply that there is no crime, but rather serves as a warning that there are serious consequences for anyone affiliated with illegal activity in the designated area. Criminals are not a protected class; this program provides the tools and information to legally evict those who participate in criminal activity.

The Apple Valley Police Department joined the Crime Free program with two goals: to see a decrease in calls for service and an increase in safety for our rental properties. Law enforcement provides participating properties with training, certification, police issued signs, and advertising privileges – all at no cost!

The Town of Apple Valley began the Crime Free Multi-Housing Program in 1995, when it was adopted by the County. Since then we have expanded to add mobile home communities, rental homes, and crime free business.

We are one of very few communities in the county that offer the Crime Free Business Program. Business owners are often told that the responsibility to prevent internal and external crime lies squarely with you. But what exactly can you do to create a safe and secure environment for your employees and your business? The Crime Free Business Program provides free training to both business owners and employees in robbery and burglary prevention, improving relationships with law enforcement, counterfeit money/credit cards, identity theft and many other essential tools to help protect you and your business.

Keeping the Greens

Have you had enough of the cold weather and short days? We have, too. The grounds crew is ready and waiting for warmer weather to get the golf course prepared for the spring and summer season. What we do in the spring time helps the golf course survive the summer heat. The major spring maintenance activity is aerification. The process helps in water percolation, relieving compaction and allowing oxygen into the root system of the turf. It's an inconvenience to golfers, but very necessary for long term sustainability.

Other spring maintenance plans include spraying pre-emergent herbicides that kill weeds before they become fully established. We will also fertilize the entire golf course. The first application usually brings the Bermuda grass out of dormancy and helps that first blush of green. Another practice that begins in the spring is the application of wetting agents, which allow water to penetrate the ground more easily and the golf course to use water more efficiently.

Each of these practices plays an important part in maintaining the golf course and to assure a quality playing surface. The timing of the application of the fertilizer and wetting agents is critical in ensuring that the golf course is in good shape and can survive the desert heat. 



He used a 7 Iron and a Titleist NXT Extreme golf ball. Mr. York has been playing since 1983, the year he became a member of AVCC. He plays about twice a week, with a handicap of 16. The odds of getting a hole in one, depending on the hole being played and the golfer's skill level, is between 8,000 and 40,000 to 1.

Golf tip of the Month:

Watch your eye line while putting. To help insure your best chance to make your putt, make sure that your eyes are directly over your ball at address.

This will help you start your putt on the right line.

Work begins on Yucca Loma Bridge project

Marking the start of the most significant public infrastructure project in Apple Valley since incorporation, a crew has begun clearing and removing trees from the bridge area across the Mojave River. Under the watchful eye of a biologist, the site has been staked and Environmentally Sensitive Area (ESA) fencing installed.

Due to the delicate environment in the river bottom, the clearing activity is taking place long before the seasonal birds and animals return for the summer. There will be a time gap now before the next construction activity gets underway. However, we expect to bid and award construction packages this summer and fall. The complex project will be phased to gain the most benefit in cost and construction sequence.

Anticipating a two-year build for the bridge structure, Yucca Loma Road street improvements will occur at the same time. After being on the drawing board since before the Town even incorporated, it is a tremendous accomplishment to have reached this point. It has taken since 2006 to secure necessary approvals and complete the environmental studies and preliminary engineering. From the Army Corps of Engineers and the Federal Highway Administration, to California Department of Fish and Game and CalTrans, to Lahontan Water Quality Control Board and San Bernardino Associated Governments, over 10 agencies and consultants have worked together to make this a reality.
